EXPLANATORY NOTES

Commodity Classification

Canadian Trade statistics are classified and published according to the International Convention on the Harmonized Commodity and Description Coding System (H.S.), as defined by the Canadian Customs Tariff and Statistical Nomenclature.

Valuation

For Customs purposes, imports are recorded at values established according to the provisions of the Customs Act, which, since January 1, 1985, reflects valuation methods based on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) Valuation Code System. It generally requires the value for duty of imported goods be equivalent to the transaction value or the price actually paid or payable provided that a number of conditions are met. One of the important conditions is that the buyer and seller must be independent of each other. If the conditions are not met, practical rules are used to determine the Customs value. Therefore, Canadian imports are valued Free on Board (F.O.B.), place of direct shipment to Canada. The Customs value excludes freight and insurance costs in bringing the goods to Canada from the point of direct shipment. Canadian exports to the U.S. are valued F.O.B. point of exit from Canada. Prior to 1990, they were valued F.O.B. place of lading net of freight charges, discounts and allowances.

Rounding

Figures may not add due to rounding.

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Canada - U.S. Exchange Rate

The Bank of Canada exchange rates were used to convert U.S. imports reported in \$US to \$Cdn.

Canada - U.S. Reconciliation

Prior to 1989, United States commodity coding was based on the Tariff Schedule of the United States (TSUSA) and comparable data are not available. Starting in January 1989, the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (H.S.) was adopted by the United States. However, Canada and the United States have been exchanging import data only since January 1990 and therefore there may be discrepancies in 1989 between Canadian exports to the United States and United States imports from Canada. As of January 1990, any discrepancy between what Canada reports as exports to the United States and what the United States reports as imports from Canada is minimal resulting from exchange rates.

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INTRODUCTION AND SCOPE

VEHICLES, HAND PROPELLED FOR THE TRANSPORT OF GOODS MARKET OVERVIEW

Vehicles, hand propelled, for the transport of goods, can be classified as Materials Handling Equipment.

The materials handling equipment industry consists of firms that are primarily concerned with the manufacture of machinery and systems designed to lift, convey and position various materials or items from one location to another. The industry also includes firms making equipment to vertically transfer people and freight.

There are 110 companies in Canada directly involved in the manufacturing of these types of equipment, with total direct employment of approximately 7,100 in 1988. Most production facilities are located in Ontario (43 percent), with significant manufacturing also in the Prairies (26 percent), Quebec (16 percent) and British Columbia (12 percent). Firms in the industry are predominantly owned by U.S. and other multinational enterprises.

The industry is composed of four subsectors. The conveyors and handling systems subsector consist of belt conveyors, stacker-reclaimers, shiploaders, feeders, pneumatic conveyors and radial stackers used for transporting goods in bulk and for applications in the resource industry, and also includes unit conveyors, roller conveyors, overhead chain conveyor systems, wire mesh conveyors automatic storage retrieval systems and palletizers used in unit handling applications. The cranes and hoists subsector includes overhead travelling bridge cranes, jib cranes, gantry cranes and winches, all used in lifting or pulling operations. The industrial lift trucks and attachments subsector includes pneumatic-tired, counterbalanced forklifts, and consists largely of components originating in the United States, Japan and Europe. This subsector is dominated by U.S.-owned Multinationals. Some Canadian subsidiaries of these firms are restricted from supplying the U.S. market from their Canadian plants.

The equipment covered by this report more approximately falls within the industrial lift truck and attachments subsector which is described below.

Shipments of industrial lift trucks and attachments in 1988 were worth \$178 million, or 20 percent of the industry total. The Canadian market for industrial lift trucks, however, was valued at \$484 million that year, or more than twice the value of Canadian shipments. Exports of \$154 million were directed almost entirely to the United States. Imports worth \$459 Million consisted of vehicle types not manufactured in Canada.

MARKET OVERVIEW (Cont'd)

The industrial lift trucks and attachments subsector is highly competitive. The range of available units in North America is extensive. The U.S. market requires some 120,000 units annually, largely for factory and warehouse purposes. Canadian production is estimated at 7,500 units, about 6 percent of the total U.S. market need. The volume of the U.S. market for industrial lift trucks and attachments has attracted significant Japanese investment in highly automated, U.S.-based manufacturing facilities. To remain competitive, manufacturers have rationalized on a North American basis by focusing Canadian manufacturing on particular model types, such as narrow-aisle units. Major restructuring has taken place, thereby improving economies of scale and specialization. On the other hand, to meet the needs of the Canadian market, Canadian producers concentrate on units peculiar to Canadian geography and requirements such as rough-terrain forklifts with specific-purpose attachments.

Three factors are likely to have a major impact on the health of the companies comprising the materials handling sector: globalization of the marketplace; international competitiveness, including the emerging competition from countries other than the United States, particularly Japan and Europe; and new technology development responding to the demand for greater automation and increased sophistication.

Volume production has not been a traditional strength of Canadian manufacturers of materials handling equipment because of the absence of a large market. Capabilities, however, do exist to develop specialized products and create niche markets, and the Canadian industry has been reasonably successful in doing so. It is anticipated that the industry will continue to restructure and adapt to a mature environment in a global marketplace.
