## LIVE STOCK SURVEY - JUNE 1, 1942

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics issues today a report on the June 1, 1942 survey of live stock and poultry dealing with numbers of the principal classes on farms. This report is based on information returned from farmers and is prepared in cooperation with the Provincial Departments of Agriculture. A report on the spring pig crop was issued on October 3, 1942. The 1941 data shown below are the preliminary figures of the 1941 census. Previously published estimates for the years 1932 to 1940 remain subject to revision in the light of the 1941 census figures.

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Moderate to substantial increases were reported for all of the principal classes of live stock on Canadian farms in the survey made at June 1, 1942. Numbers of cattle increased by 5.1 per cent over the 1941 figure; sheep numbers increased by 11.6 per cent; horses by 1 per cent and in the case of hogs the increase was 17 per cent. Very little change is indicated in cattle numbers for the five eastern provinces but in the Prairie Provinces the increases were 9.2 per cent in Alberta, 12.0 per cent in Saskatchewan and 16.8 per cent in Manitoba. With feed supplies more than adequate, it would seem likely that this tendency to increase will be continued.

The upward trend in numbers of horses on farms which commenced in 1939 was continued for the Dominion as a whole although the percentage increase was relatively small. Saskatchewan is the leading province in numbers of horses on farms and it was in this province that the greatest increase over 1941 was recorded.

There was a substantial gain of 11.6 per cent in numbers of sheep on farms at June 1 over those reported in the 1941 census. The increase was particularly marked in each of the three Prairie Provinces. Increases of a less important nature were shown for all the other provinces. Higher prices for live stock and live stock products as well as record supplies of feed grains at relatively low prices have been largely responsible for the increased live stock numbers. Converted to a basis of grain-consuming animal units, numbers of all species of live stock and poultry at June 1, 1942 totalled 19,230,000 units compared with 17,546,000 units in 1941. The 1942 figure is the highest ever recorded on Canadian farms.

A sharp increase of 15.7 per cent in the number of hens and chickens on farms at June 1, 1942 in comparison with the 1941 figure brought the total number to 68.1 million. This is the highest total ever recorded and will be reflected in greater egg production and supplies of poultry meat during 1942-43. Numbers of turkeys on farms at June 1 show a very substantial increase of 31.5 per cent over the number on hand at June 1, 1941.


