LIVE STOCK SURVEY - JUNE 1, 1943

Ottawa, October 14, 1943.— The Dominion Bureau of Statistics issues today a report on the June 1, 1943 survey of live stock and poultry dealing with numbers of the principal classes on farms. This report is based on information returned from farmers and is prepared in cooperation with the Provincial Departments of Agriculture. A report on the spring pig crop was issued on September 13, 1943. The 1941 data shown below are the preliminary figures of the 1941 census. Previously published estimates for the years 1932 to 1940 remain subject to revision in the light of the 1941 census figures.

SUMMARY

A further substantial increase of 8.1 per cent in numbers of cattle on farms is shown in the results of the June 1, 1943 survey as compared with a year previously. Numbers of sheep were also higher by 8.2 per cent but in the case of horses, there was a minor decline of 1.5 per cent. As previously reported, there was an increase of 14.4 per cent in the numbers of hogs on farms at June 1, 1943. Numbers of hens and chickens on farms increased by 10.1 per cent over the previous year but numbers of turkeys declined sharply to 80.8 per cent from 1942.

The increase in cattle numbers was common to all provinces but was most marked in the Prairies and in British Columbia where farmers and particularly ranchers have been holding back animals for restocking and further feeding. Milk cow numbers increased by 114,000 for the country as a whole and were higher in all provinces except Prince Edward Island where a minor decline was reported.

Numbers of horses declined slightly in all provinces except New Brunswick and British Columbia. Sheep numbers, on the other hand, were higher in all provinces with particularly good increases shown in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Saskatchewan. Higher returns from sheep and wool production have encouraged an expansion in sheep raising which has been substantial over the past two years.

The demand for live stock and live stock products both in Canada and abroad continues strong and although feed supplies are not as favourable in eastern Canada this year as a year ago, it would seem likely that farmers will maintain or increase the live stock production subject to the limitations of their resources of feed and labour. Converting all species of live stock and poultry to a common unit of grain-consuming animal units, the June 1943 total is 20,740,529 units compared with 19,230,000 units in 1942. The 1943 figure is up 7.8 per cent over 1942 and is the highest ever recorded.

A further increase of 10.1 per cent in hens and chicken numbers resulted from increases in all provinces with the sharpest expansion occurring in British Columbia, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan. Numbers of hens and chickens are at an all time high. Turkey numbers declined in all provinces due mainly to unfavourable weather conditions during the hatching season.
