



FOREWORD

The tables that follow present statistics for establishments engaged in processing, packing and handling fish at the secondary industrial level. These establishments constitute an integral part of the Bureau's industrial statistics of the Foods and Beverages Group. Some fishermen also process the fish they land to a certain degree, but their operations are not included here. Furthermore the inland areas (Ontario, Prairie Provinces and Northwest Territories) are not at present included in the Census of Industry Survey although some fish processing is done there.

Prior to 1956, the fish processing establishments were not clearly defined and included not only establishments engaged in the actual processing of fish i.e. cutting, drying, freezing, etc., but also those whose function was to assemble fish or fishery products, i.e. lobsters, salt fish etc. In order to put this industry on a comparable basis with other industries in the Census of Industry, it was decided to distinguish between these two types of establishments.

For the purpose of this Census of Industry report the following definitions have been made:—

Fish Processor — a company whose main business is the processing of fish, i.e. cutting, freezing, drying, salting, smoking, pickling, canning etc.

Fish Packer or Handler — a company whose main business is buying, wholesaling, packing or handling; who buys and sells fresh fish only; or who buys processed fish or fish products and sells without further processing.

Increases in the number of establishments in 1956 over those reported in 1955 are largely due to the better coverage of "Handlers", chiefly in Newfoundland, made possible by the better definition of the industry. It should be emphasized that segregation of firms into (a) Processors and (b) Packers and Handlers for 1955 was made on the basis of the 1956 returns.

Beginning in 1956, establishments were asked to report actual sales or shipments rather than production as in the past. As a consequence, the principal statistics for 1956 are not fully comparable with those of previous years. Details of production will be found in another D.B.S. annual "Fisheries Statistics of Canada, 1956."
