SUMMARY OF COLD STORAGE REPORTS, 1936

This summary contains a record of food commodities held in cold storage plants and dairy factories by months during 1936. The data appearing in this statement differ to some extent from those published in the current monthly reports, certain revisions being made to cover holdings for firms that failed to submit their returns in time to be included in the original statement. A number of changes have also been made by reporting firms whose returns were found to be inaccurate or incomplete when first submitted to the Bureau. In most cases the figures were revised in an upward direction but where the data are less than those published in the first report this fact has been indicated by symbols set opposite the figures concerned.

Since July 1, 1936, cold storage holdings formerly shown in one statement have been published in three separate reports, namely "Stocks of Dairy and Poultry Products", "Cold Storage Holdings of Meat and Fish" and "Stocks of Apples and Small Fruits". A change was also made in the method of presenting comparative data, the plan of showing stocks on the basis of "limited lists" of firms (those reporting for both the current month and the previous month) being replaced by a statement of complete holdings at the first of the current month, the previous month and the same month in the preceding year.

The inclusion of estimates to cover the holdings of firms that had failed to report was likewise introduced for the first time in the statement of July 1, thus giving a numerical value to the holdings of these firms. On November 1 the plan of estimating these unrecorded holdings for the current month was extended to account for the stocks held by firms failing to report in time for their figures to be included in the subsequent monthly statement. Since cold storage reports are collected from every part of Canada within a period of six days it should be understood that the data published in the first statement are largely of a preliminary character; but the second report, containing most of the corrections made by reporting firms and the actual holdings of firms formerly shown as outstanding, are reasonably comparable with the final figures published in the Annual Summary.

Due to arrangements made with the Provincial Dairy Commissioners and Statisticians to collect and assemble cold storage data reported by dairy factories in their respective domains, it was found possible to extend the list of factories to include all operating firms. This arrangement went into effect on February 1, 1936, in all parts of the Dominion except in the Provinces of Manitoba and Alberta. On July 1 the plan was made effective in Manitoba. In Table I following, the numbers of firms added to the list by months has reference to the additions made to the mailing list during the previous twelve months. The numbers of these firms that actually reported stocks are also shown together with the quantities of creamery butter and cheese contributed by them. On account of so many of the factories being closed during the winter season only a small proportion of those who failed to report are listed as actually outstanding (See Table II). Besides, a number of those that were in operation did not have facilities for carrying any more than a week to week supply. With the exception of a few of those listed in the last three months of the year, all outstanding firms were dairy factories holding butter and cheese. It is significant, too, that the majority of those failing to report were new firms added within the last year. The fact that those concerns which have been reporting stocks for some years are sending in their statements with reasonable regularity, demonstrates the value of educational work in securing prompt returns and as time goes on this feature of the problem may be expected to disappear.

At the first of December, 1936, there were 2,982 firms receiving schedules for reporting Stocks of Food commodities. Included in this number were 1,181 concerns added during the previous twelve months, as shown in the above table. The distribution by provinces appears below.

The inspection system which was started in 1935 was further extended in 1936, two men devoting their entire time to the work during the summer months. Visits were made to 555 firms in Ontario and Quebec and 188 firms in the western provinces. Except in cases where there were no stock records, the holdings were counted, checked and reconciled with the figures reported to the Bureau at the first of the preceding month. While a few duplications and errors were revealed, the mistakes were principally due to inadequate records or a misunderstanding of the requirements; in no case was there any indication of a deliberate attempt to misrepresent stock holdings, the firms themselves being anxious to make their reports as accurate as possible. After all adjustments were made to account for stocks over-reported and stocks under-reported, the net result did not materially alter the stock position in the Dominion.
