

THE MACARONI AND VERHICELLI INDUSTRY IN CAMADA, 1925.

Ottawa, October, 1926. A report is herewith presented on the production of magazoni and vermicelli in Canada during the calendar year 1925. The number of establishments reporting rose from 9 in 1923 to 11 in 1924 and 1925 which were located by provinces as follows: - Ontario 4, Quebec 3, Manitoba 2, Alberta 1, British Columbia 1. In order to prevent disclosure of information concerning individual establishments, statistics for the last 3 provinces have been combined and are shown, throughout this report under the head of Western provinces. A summary of the principal statistics of the industry is given in Table I compared for the calendar years 1924 and 1925.



Production

The quantity and value of mararoni, vermicelli etc. produced during the calendar years 1924 and 1925 is given by provinces in Table II. There was an increase in both the quantity produced and the selling value of the product. In 1924 the amount was reported at 14,613,241 pounds valued at \$1,217,285. During the period covered by this report the quantity rose to 14,723,598 pounds worth \$1,250,949, and increase of 110,357 pounds and \$33,664 in selling value.

Capital Investment

The capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1925 is given by provinces in Table III. The total capitalization rose from \$1,227,925 in 1924 to \$1,292,049 in 1925, an increase of \$ 54,124. Of the total capitalization the province of Quebec contributed \$769,135 being 59.4 per cent of the total capital investment of the Dominion.

Employees, Salaries and Wages.

The number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1925 is given in Table IV by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees fell from 265 in 1924 to 261 in 1925, a decrease of 4, and the payroll rose from \$231,252 in 1924 to \$224,478 in 1925, or a decrease of \$6,774.



Other Employment Statistics

The number of days the establishments were in operation during the calendar year 1925 together with the number of hours per day and per week normally worked by wage-earners, is shown in Table V(a). The number of wage-earners employed during the same period are given by sex and by months in Table V(b). Employment reached the peak in February when 257 persons were on the paywoll and the least number reported was 171 in the month of June.

Materials Used.


The cost of all materials used in the industry during the calendar year 1925 rose from \$712,711 in 1924 to \$795,203 for the period under review, an increase of \$82,492. Of the total expenditure for all materials used Quebec accounted for \$540,732 or 68 per cent. Manufacturers of macaroni were not required to furnish information relating to either kind or quantity of materials used during 1925.

Fuel Consumption

The quantity and cost of all fuel comsumed in the industry during the calendar year 1925 is given in Table VI. Fuel costs fell from \$13,368 in 1924 to \$10,173 in 1925, a decrease of \$3,195. Anthracite coal was the principal item of fuel reported followed by bituminous coal, whilst gas, artificial ranks third in importance.

Power Installation

The power employed in the industry during the calendar year 1925 is given in Table VII. The only class of power reported was electric motors operated by purchased power, whose total rose from 131 units with 820 horse power capacity in 1924 to 135 units developing 825 horse power or an increase of 2 units and 5 horse power.
