The statistics relating to by-products of the slaughtering and meat packing industry and products of the industries of sausage and sausage casings and animal oils and fats are not in all cases to be regarded as comprehensive, as by-products like lard compound and shortening are also found as products of the vegetable oil industry, and glue and fertilizer as products of the chemical industry.

> > INTRODUCTION

for 1929 Mont The Slaughtering and Meat Packing industry occupies third place in value of production among the principal manufacturing industries of Canada, being exceeded in this respect by only the industries of pulp and paper and flour and grist mill products. It is also third on the list for value of raw materials, sixth for number of employees and fifth for amount paid in salaries and wages. For capital investment it does not rank as high, being only sixteenth on the list of principal industries.

> ESTABLISHMENTS. - There were in Canada in 1928, 75 establishments engaged in slaughtering and meat packing operations, located by provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island, 1; Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 9; Quebec, 17; Ontario, 25; Manitoba, 6; Alberta, 6; Saskatchewan, 3; and British Columbia, 7. Nearly all of the plants are engaged in operations on a large scale, only 17 of the total number in 1928 having a production valued at less than \$100,000. Eighteen of the plants had a value of output ranging from \$100,000 to under \$500,000; 5 a value of from \$500,000 to under \$1,000,000; 16 a value of from \$1,000,000 to under \$2,000,000; and 19 a value of \$2,000,000 and over,


> PRODUCTION. - The total value of output in 1928 amounted to \$174,096,419, and is the highest recorded for any year since 1920. Taking the production of meats in 1928 as a whole the quantity is shown to have been slightly less than in the preceding year, the higher average prices accounting for the increase in total value of output of \$6,875,527. Of the meats sold fresh, beef advanced from 12 cents a pound in 1927 to 14 cents in 1928; veal from 13½ cents to 16 cents; and mutton from $20\frac{1}{2}$ cents to 21 cents, while pork declined from 17 cents in 1927 to 162 cents in 1928. Mutton and lamb and pork sold fresh show increases in quantity over the preceding year, but decreases are recorded for beef and veal. A survey of the various items under the head of cured meats shows that the production of bacon and sides dropped from 69 million pounds in 1927 to 52 million pounds in 1928, and salted pork from 47 million pounds to 35 million pounds, while the production of hams increased from 222 million pounds to 272 million pounds, and shoulders from 82 million pounds to 10 million jounds. The average price per pound for hams advanced from 242 cents in 1927 to 26 cents in 1928, and for bacon and sides from 24 cents to 27 cents. The items of lard, lard compounds and shortening, other, all show increases in quantity of production, with corresponding increases in value. Prices of hides and skins were considerably higher in 1928 than in 1927: the average price of cattle hides advanced from \$8.38 in 1927 to \$11.01 in 1928; sheep skins from \$1.38 to \$1.83; and calf skins from \$2.22 to \$2.94.

> The total value of output of the industry for the years 1917 to 1928 is given in table 1 which follows, while table 2 shows quantity and value of production, by items, for the years 1926, 1927 and 1928.





CAPITAL. - The capital investment of the industry in 1928 was valued at \$55,195,507, apportioned as follows: land, buildings and machinery, \$31,536,330; materials and supplies on hand, stocks in process, etc., \$20,021,362; and cash and operating accounts, \$14,640,815. The total capital shows an increase of \$5,586,478 over the preceding year. The mapital investment averaged \$332,647 per establishment in 1928 compared with \$797,526 in 1927.

TIME IN OPERATION AND HOURS OF WORK. The total number of days in operation by all plants during the year 1928 was 21,704, or an average of 289.4 days per plant, compared with a total of 22,185 days and an average of 291.9 days in 1927. The average working day for wage-earners in the industry as a whole consisted of 9.1 hours, and the working week, of 51.6 hours, compared with a working day of 8.8 hours and a working week of 50.6 hours in 1927.

EXPLOYERS AND SALARIES AND WAGES.— The industry gave employment in 1928 to 11,244 persons, comprising 2,677 classified as salaried employees and 8,567 as wage-earners. The amount paid in salaries for the year was \$4,898,201 and in wages, \$9,344,161. The total number of employees shows an increase over the preceding year of 196, but the amount paid in salaries and wages decreased by \$308,888. Employment of wage-earners was at its highest for the year 1928 in November, when 9,033 persons were on the pay-roll; the months of lowest employment were March and April, each of these months recording 7,979 wage-earners.

FUEL USED. - The principal item in the cost of fuel used in 1928 was coal, with a total value of \$721,823. followed by electricity with \$416,910. These two items make up 93 per cent of the total of \$1,220,887 expended for fuel in 1928.

POWER EQUIPMENT. - The power equipment of the plants had a total rated capacity of 33,116 h.p.. The industry uses chiefly electricity, the 1,958 motors in 1928 supplying 27.333 horse power; of the total number of electric motors 1,878 were operated by power purchased from central electric stations and 80 by power generated in the plants.


ANIMALS SLAUGHTERED AND MATERIALS USED. - As in the case of production, the total cost value of animals slaughtered and materials used during the year shows a considerable increase over the preceding year, although quantities for most items are rather smaller than in 1927. The total value of all items was \$142,396,342, compared with \$133,076,361 in the preceding year. The dressed weight of beeves slaughtered was 358,194,721 pounds, valued at \$53,168,193, a decrease in quantity of about 25 million pounds, but an increase in value of 9 million dollars. The dressed weight of hogs slaughtered was 406,985,776 pounds, valued at \$55,097,709, a decrease in quantity of 3 million pounds and a decrease in value of 2 million dollars. The average cost value per pound, dressed weight, for beeves was 14½ cents, compared with 11½ cents in 1927, and for hogs, dressed weight, 13½ cents compared with 13¾ cents. The total number of all kinds of animals slaughtered in 1928 was 1,579,984 compared with 4,583,808 in 1927. Dressed meat purchased fresh or partially cured had a total cost value of \$9,604,490; poultry a value of \$1,755,372, and miscellaneous materials, including cottonseed oil, other animal and vegetable oils, salt, sugar containers, wrappings, and sundries, a value of \$10,734,192.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS. - The value of products of the Conadian slaughtering and meat packing industry exported during the calendar year 1928 was \$34,952,150, compared with \$39,790,271 in 1927. The principal items in both years were "beef, fresh, chilled or frozen", and "bacon and hams, shoulders and sides". Imports of meat and meat products in 1928 had a total value of \$24,846,225, an increase over the preceding year of \$3,790,689. The value of imports of hides and skins in 1928 accounted for 56 per cent of the total value of all imports.
