The statistics relating to by-products of the slaughtering and meat packing industry and products of the industries of sausage and sausage casings and animal oils and fats are not in all cases to be regarded as comprehensive, as by-products like lard compound and shortening are also found as products of the vegetable oil industry, and glue and fertilizer as products of the chemical industry.

# THE SLAUGHTERING AND MEAT PACKING INDUSTRY, CANADA, 1929.

The Slaughtering and Meat Packing Industry occupies third place in value of production among the forty leading manufacturing industries of Canada, being exceeded in this resepct by only the industries of pulp and paper and flour and grist mill products. It is second on the list for value of raw materials, twenty-second for number of employees, sixteenth for amount paid in salaries and wages, and sixteenth also for capital investment.

ESTABLISHMENTS. - The number of plants classified as slaughtering and meat packing establishments in operation in Canada in 1929 was 74, located by provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island, 2; Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 8; Quebec, 17; Ontario, 25; Manitoba, 6; Saskatchewan, 3; Alberta, 6; and British Columbia, 6. Of the total number of plants, 63 were engaged in both slaughtering and meat packing, 4 in slaughtering only, and 7 in meat packing only. Nearly all of the plants are operated on a large scale, only 13 of the total number having a product in 1929 valued at less than \$100,000. There were 27 plants with a product valued at from \$100,000 to under \$1,000,000; 10 with a product of from \$1,000,000 to under \$2,000,000, and 24 with a product valued at \$2,000,000 and over. The classification of establishments according to number of employees shows 49 plants in the group of those having less than 100 employees; 18 in the group of those having from 100 to under 500 employees; and 7 in the group of those having 500 employees and over.


PRODUCTION. The total value of production of slaughtering and meat packing plants in Canada during the year 1929 was \$185,842,902, an increase over the preceding 'year of \$11,746,483, or 6½ per cent, and an increase over the year 1927 of \$18,622,010, or 11 per cent. The value shown for 1929 is the highest recorded for any year of the nine-year period, 1921 to 1929. The low year of the period was 1924, when the value of output amounted to \$133,740,271, but since that year there has been a steady annual increase. The general average of the nine-year period was \$158,512,697, and the production of 1929 exceeds this average by over 27 million dollars. Prices in 1929 were higher than in either of the two preceding years for all kinds of meats sold fresh: beef rose from 11.6 cents per pound in 1927 to 14.0 cents in 1928 and to 14.9 cents in 1929; mutton and lamb from 20.5 cents per pound in 1927 to 20.9 cents in 1928 and to 21.1 cents in 1929; and veal from 13.6 cents per pound in 1927 to 16.0 cents in 1928 and to 17.5 cents in 1929. Pork dropped from 17.0 cents per pound in 1927 to 16.7 cents in 1928, but

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. rose again in 1929 to 18,5 cents. The meats sold fresh in 1929 comprised beef, 350,817-228 pounds, valued at \$52,292,355, a decrease in quantity from the preceding year of 2,298,851 pounds, but an increase in value of \$2.631,810; veal, 34,246,402 pounds, valued at \$6,002,301, a decrease in quantity of 2.327,654 pounds, but an increase in value of \$139,195; pork, 144,753,695 poinds, valued at \$27,050,662, an increase in · quantity of 3,397,107 pounds and in value of \$3,426,144 and mutton and lamb. 32,014,-827 pounds, valued at \$6.773, 730, an increase in quantity of 3,405,059 pounds and in value of \$788,979. In the nine-year period 1921 to 1929 the annual quantity of beef sold fresh has increased by 321 per cent. veal by 75 per cent and pork by 86 per cent, while the output of mutton and lamb has decreased by 6 per cent. The average price per pound for beef in 1929 was 1.5 cents higher than in 1921, for mutton and lamb 1.5 cents higher, and for veal 2,4 cents higher, while for pork the average price per pound in 1929 was 2.7 cents lower than in 1921. Among the cured meats, bacon and sides comprise the principal item, with a output in 1929 of 55,182,765 pounds, valued at \$16,319,959. Cured meats have not shared in the increase of the nine-year period, but on the contrary show a decrease in total output owing to the item of "shoulders" having dropped from 55 million pounds in 1921 to 13 million pounds in 1929. The production of lard and of lard compound and other shortenings in 1929 increased in quantity over the preceding year but decreased in value owing to lower average prices, the average price per pound for lard in 1929 being 15.2 cents, compared with 16.3 cents in 1928, and of lard compound and other shortenings, 13.7 cents, compared with 14.1 cents in 1928. Average prices for cattle hides and for calf and sheep skins were considerably lower in 1929 tham in 1928, prices for hides having dropped from \$11.01 per hide in 1928 to \$8.13 in 1929; for calf skins from \$2.94 per skin to \$2.36; and for sheep skins from \$1.83 to \$1.34. The 1929 prices for bides and skins were higher, however, than in 1927. The following tables show (1) the total value of products sold during the years 1921 to 1929, and (2) the quantity and value of products sold, by fitems for the years 1927 to 1929.





Capital. The capital investment of the industry in 1929 had a total value of \$67,777,803, this amount being apportioned as follows: land, buildings and equipment, \$28,738,653; materials on hand, stocks in process, etc., \$19,772,760; and cash and operating accounts, \$19,266,390. The average capital investment per establishment increased from \$882,646 in 1928 to \$942,943 in 1929.

Time in Operation. The total number of days operated by all establishments during the year was 21,433, or an average per establishment of 289.6 days, compared with a total of 21,704 days and an average per establishment of 289.4 days in 1928.

Employees and Salaries and Wages. There were 10,762 persons employed by the plants in 1929, comprising 8,263 wage-earners and 2,499 salaried employees. The wage-earners received for their work during the year a total of \$9,274,034, and the calaried employees a total of \$4,724,682, making a total salary and wage bill for the industry of \$13,998,716. Compared with the preceding year the total number of employees shows a decrease of 482 and the salaries and wages a decrease of \$243,646. Employment for wage-earners in 1929 was at its height in November, when 9,069 persons were on the pay roll; the month of lowest employment was March, when 7,703 persons were employed. These months were also the highest and lowest respectively in 1928. The average number of hours worked by wage-earners per day in this industry during 1929 was 8.8 and the average number per week, 49.4. Compared with the preceding year, the number of hours worked per day shows a decrease of 0.3, and the number of hours per week a decrease of 2.2.

Animals Slaughtered and Materials Used. The number of animals slaughtered in the plants during the year was 4,444,174, with a total dressed weight of 821,244,212 pounds, and a total cost value of \$126,501,496. For the year 1928 the corresponding figures were: total number slaughtered, 4,579,984; total dressed weight, 831,264,235 pounds; and total cost value, \$120,322,288. Decreases from 1928 are shown in the number of beeves, hogs and calves slaughtered, and an increase in the number of sheep and lambs, but total cost values of all four items were greater in 1929 owing to higher average prices. The quantities of poultry killed and dressed and of dressed meat purchased fresh or partly cured show increases over 1928 in both quantity and value.

Other materials used in 1929 include cottonseed oil, 38,762,419 pounds, an increase over the preceding year of 4,436,710 pounds, and other animal and vegetable oils,25,037,678 pounds, an increase of 14,653,815 pounds. The total cost value of all animals slaughter, ed and materials used in 1929 was \$151,814,517, compared with \$142,395,342 in 1928.

It might be interesting here to compare returns of slaughterings in 1929 with those of 1921. During the nine year period there was an increase of 39 per cent in (page 5½ follows)

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the total number of animals slaughtered. The number of beeves slaughtered shows an increase of 39 per cent, the number of sheep and lambs an increase of 1 per cent; of hogs an increase of 48 per cent, and of calves an increase of 100 per cent. The following table shows the numbers of the different kinds of animals slaughtered in the years 1921 to 1929.

Imports and Exports. Decreases from the preceding year are recorded in both imports and exports of products of the slaughtering and meat packing industry. The total value of the imports dropped from \$24,846,225 in 1928 to \$20,784,315 in 1929, while the value of the exports dropped from \$34,952,150 to \$26,223,161. The principal items of export in 1929 were: hides and skins, \$7,632,337, bacon and hams, shoulders and sides, \$6,868,646; and beef, fresh, chilled or frozen, \$4,852,181.

Consumption of Meats. The following statement, prepared by the Agricultural Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, shows the estimated total consumption and consumption per capita of meats in Canada in 1929.
