THE SUGAR INDUSTRY, 1918.

A preliminary report on the sugar industry in Canada for the calendar year 1918 has just been completed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, covering the operations of 8 plants.

According to location 3 plants are situated in the province of Outpute. 2 in Quebec and 1 each in British Columbia, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Capital Investment.

The amount of capital invested in the industry for the whole Dominion was \$37,256,851, apportioned by items as follows: land buildings and fixtures \$17,733,990; machinery and tools \$6.103,445; materials, stocks in process, ginished products, fuel and miscellaneous supplies on hand \$6,511,626, and cash, trading and creating accounts and bills receivable \$6,902,790. The capital invested in Ontario plants was \$11,407,382, in Quebec \$5,869,592 and in the remaining provinces \$19,979,877.

Employees, Salaries and Wages.

The number of persons by classes of employment and by sex, together with the amounts paid to each in salaries and wages afe presented in the following table:-

Fuel Consumption.

The cost for fuel of all kinds during the year was \$1,560,218, of which \$401,754 was of Canadian origin and \$1,158,464 of foreign origin. The kinds of fuel used were - coal 181,059

Miscellaneous Expenses.

The items of miscellaneous expenses were - rent of confices, works, etc., \$4,135; rent of power \$30,925; insurance premiums \$99,095; taxes (internal revenue, war, etc) \$454,986; taxes (provincial, municipal, etc.) \$155,872; advertising expenses \$101.345; travelling expenses \$14,737; ordinary repairs to buildings and machinery \$665,562; and all other sundry expenses \$2,349,474, making a total of \$3,856,131.
