## Capital Investment.

The arnount of capital invested in the industry for the whine Duminion was ${ }^{W} 37,256,851$, apportioned by items as follows: lat Jildings and fixtures $17,733,990$; machinery and tools $\$ 6.114,45 ;$ materials, stocks in process, finished products, fuel and msoeifaneous supplies on hand $\$ 6,511,626$, and cash, trading ani cracting accounts and bills receivable $\$ 5,902,790$. The cay in invested in ontario plants was \$11,407,382, in quebec $\$ 5,869.592$ and in the remaining provinces $\$ 19,979,877$.
