

THE COFFEE, TEA, SPICE AND MISCELLANEOUS FOOD INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1936.

A report is herewith presented on the coffee, tea, spice and miscellaneous food industries in Canada during the year 1936. The report is divided into three sections. Section 1, comprises a general review of the whole industry, and includes tables showing the combined items of production and materials used. Section 2, comprises the coffee, tea and spice industry, with tables covering principal statistics, capital investment, employment, salaries and wages, power equipment and fuel and electricity consumed. Section 3, covers the miscellaneous food industry, and contains similar information in tabular form to that given in Section 2.

SECTION 1. - GENERAL REVIEW OF THE ENTIRE INDUSTRY

The principal items of production are coffee, roasted and ground; tea, blended and packed; spices, mixed whole or ground; baking powder; vegetable shortening; yeast; flavouring extracts; jelly powders; refined edible oils, and many other items which are shown in detail in Table 1.

The materials used include green coffee beans; loose tea; spice materials; baking powder chemicals; vegetable oils; sugar and numerous other ingredients which are itemized in Table 2.

Reports were received from 208 establishments whose entire output was valued at \$42,657,613, and the total expenditure for materials used amounted to \$27,456,788. Employees totalled 3,903, with salary and wage payments of \$4,380,570, while the capital invested amounted to \$23,722,097.

Imports and exports are shown in Tables 3 and 4.

The statistics published in the present report include only the statistics of those manufacturing establishments whose principal products are coffee, tea, spices and miscellaneous foods. Statistics relating to specific products, are, therefore, not to be regarded as the total production for Canada since such products as jams, marmalades, mincemeat, catsup, fountain fruits, peanut butter, confectionery, etc., are also found as secondary or major products of other industries.

SECTION 2. - THE COFFEE, TEA AND SPICE INDUSTRY

In this section of the industry, ninety-two establishments reported their operations during 1936, and were located by provinces as follows:- Nova Scotia, 4; New Brunswick, five; Quebec, twenty-one; Ontario, thirty-six; Manitoba, nine; Saskatchewan, three; Alberta, four and British Columbia, ten; this being an increase of six establishments over the total reporting for the previous year.

The capital investment decreased from \$13,431,195 in 1935 to \$13,347,535 in 1936, a decline of \$83,660. There was a decrease of 32 employees, and a decrease of \$172,664 in the amount paid in salaries and wages. The amount expended for materials rose from \$17,543,308 in 1935 to \$19,140,291 in 1936, an increase of \$1,596,983. The value of production increased during the two-year period to the extent of \$2,197,331.

The quantity and cost of the various materials used and the quantity and selling value of products are given by items in Tables 1 and 2 (pages 2 to 5).

Detailed statistics of capital investment, size of establishments, employment, salaries and wages, monthly employment of wage-earners, hours worked per week by wage-earners, power equipment and consumption of fuel and electricity, are given in Tables 5 to 12 which follows.

SECTION 3. - THE MISCELLANEOUS FOOD INDUSTRY, 1936.

This section of the industry comprises statistics of such industries whose production consists of food products, but which, owing to the nature of their ingredients, cannot properly be classified in any one particular group in sufficient numbers to warrant the publication of special reports but are important enough to present in combined form under the above designation. There were 116 establishments reporting in 1936, located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; New Brunswick, 1; Quebec, 41; Ontario, 50; Manitoba, 4; Saskatchewan, 1; Alberta, 3 and British Columbia, 14.

The principal items of production, the output of three or more establishments, were: yeast, fresh and dried; shortening; baking powder; jelly powders; flavouring extracts; peanut butter; prepared cocoanut, and food drinks. Detailed statistics will be found on reference to Table 1 (pages 2 and 3).

The materials used are too numerous and varied in character to itemize here, but will be found in detail in Table 2 (pages 3, 4 and 5).

The principal statistics of the industry together with capital investment, employees, salaries and wages, size of establishments, monthly employment of wage-earners, hours of work, power equipment and fuel and electricity are given in Tables 13 to 20.


