

THE TOBACCO INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1936.

The tobacco industries in Canada are divided into two distinct operations, and this report is separated into two sections accordingly. Section 1 covers the operations of all firms engaged in the manufacture of tobacco, smoking and chewing, snuff, cigars and cigarettes. Section 2 deals with the preliminary operations which consist of the processing and packing of raw leaf tobacco.

SECTION 1. - TOBACCO MANUFACTURES, 1936.

The output of the tobacco manufacturing industry in 1936, including excise duties was valued at \$73,259,732 which represents an increase of \$3,430,210 or almost 5 per cent above that of the previous year. Cigarettes formed the main item of production with an output of 5,607,228 thousand valued at \$43,763,029. Smoking tobacco was next in importance with an output of 20,588,645 pounds valued at \$18,674,685. This was followed by cigars with a production of 119,827 thousand valued at \$5,282,500, chewing tobacco 2,885,940 pounds valued at \$2,435,752 and snuff 789,819 pounds valued at \$1,080,111.

The number of establishments engaged in the tobacco industry totalled 95 located by provinces as follows: - Prince Edward Island 2, Quebec 57, Ontario 27, Manitoba 2, and British Columbia 7. These plants represented a capital investment of \$58,785,097 in fixed and current assets, they furnished employment to 7,593 persons who were paid \$7,207,737 in salaries and wages. They also spent \$20,111,289 for materials and containers, and produced goods with a net selling value at the factory of \$40,287,359. Of the establishments reporting in this industry, 48 made cigars only, 30 made tobacco only, 7 made tobacco and cigarettes, 5 made tobacco and cigars, 1 made snuff only, 1 made tobacco and snuff, 2 made tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, and 1 made tobacco, cigars and snuff.

In view of the fact that the importance of an industry is measured by the value of its production, the Bureau has found it advisable to deduct the excise taxes paid in determining the value of production of this industry, since the inclusion of these taxes enhance the importance of this industry, an importance which is not warranted by either the amount of employment furnished or the salaries and wages paid.

Compared with the previous year there was an increase of \$606,384 in the capital invested, but a decrease of 21 in the number of establishments reporting. The number of employees declined to 552; the salary and wage payments were also less by \$15,511. The cost of materials used increased by \$409,904.

The decrease of 552 employees is not due to the decrease of 21 in the number of establishments reporting. The decrease in the number of establishments occurred in the lowest group, viz., those employing fewer than 20 persons. This group reported a decrease of only 129 persons as compared with a decrease of 423 persons for the larger establishments.

The tobacco industry also contributes materially to the agricultural economy of Canada. Of the materials used, amounting to \$20,111,289, \$15,421,767 was for raw leaf tobacco. All told, the tobacco industry consumed 39,477,782 pounds of raw leaf tobacco of which 33,502,144 pounds was of domestic origin. For the production of cigars, 650,319 pounds of imported and 1,945,632 pounds of domestic tobacco were used; for the production of cigarettes, 2,873,570 pounds of...

imported and 12,053,005 pounds of domestic tobacco were required, while for the production of smoking and chewing tobacco and snuff, 2,451,749 pounds of imported and 19,503,507 pounds of domestic tobacco were used.

Foreign trade in manufactured tobacco is small compared with the domestic production. In 1936 imports of cigars were valued at \$37,432, cigarettes \$44,243, cut tobacco \$289,878, snuff \$10,374, and all other manufactured tobacco \$79,212. There was an export of 10,212,503 pounds of unmanufactured tobacco valued at \$3,037,916. Compared with the previous year, there was an increase of 2,545,569 pounds in the quantity of raw tobacco exported.

SECTION 2. - TOBACCO PROCESSING AND PACKING.

This section of the tobacco industry deals with the primary operations of processing the green raw leaf into the state where it is in fit condition to undergo the final stage of conversion into the finished article in the form of smoking and chewing tobacco, cigars and cigarettes. During the year 1936 reports were received from sixteen firms, eight of which were located in the Province of Quebec and eight in Ontario. Principal statistics for this section of the industry, are shown by provinces, in the following tables.

The amount of raw leaf tobacco processed during the year 1936 was 48,153,753 pounds with a selling value of \$12,811,420 compared with 32,783,743 pounds processed in 1935 with a selling value of \$8,211,546. In addition to this a further sum of \$113,251 was received from custom packing. The principal variety of processed raw leaf was "bright flue-cured" of which 31,386,100 pounds were prepared with a valuation of \$9,816,868. In order of importance "burley" follows with 10,630,742 pounds valued at \$1,910,195. The quantity and selling value of all tobacco processed is shown by kinds for Canada and the provinces in table 2.

The materials used in this section of the tobacco industry are given by provinces in table 3. The raw leaf tobacco used to produce the 48,153,753 pounds of processed leaf was 55,091,390 pounds. In order of importance "bright, flue-cured" takes first place with a total of 35,244,362 pounds with a cost value of \$8,568,363 followed by "burley" with a total of 12,489,232 pounds at a cost of \$1,525,084. The expenditure incurred in providing the necessary containers and other packaging material amounted to \$42,412.

The capital invested in this section of the industry for the year 1936 amounted to \$6,022,580. Of this total, fixed capital--which consists of land, buildings, plant and equipment--contributed \$1,912,763 and working capital--which comprises (a) materials on hand, stocks in process, finished products on hand, and (b) cash operating accounts and bills receivable--accounted for \$4,109,817. The total capital invested is shown by provinces in table 4.
