

Note: In addition, several special statements are available. These include Monthly Meat Products, Monthly Stocks of Canned Foods, Monthly Production of Alfalfa Meal, Quarterly Bread and Bakery Products, 20 Seasonal Commodity Reports of Canned Fruits and Vegetables including Irish Potatoes.

Number of establishments in 1958 dropped to 25 from 33 in 1957, while employees increased to 8,476 from 8,372 and their salaries and wages to \$32,144,-000 from \$29,350,000. Cost of materials climbed to \$108,872,000 from \$100,294,-000 in the preceding year and value added by manufacture to \$88,231,000 from \$82,037,000.

Value of factory shipments in 1958, including excise duties and taxes, advanced 7.9% to \$522,529,000 from \$484,176,000 in the previous year. Shipments of cigarettes climbed to 32,777,573,000 (valued at \$439,367,000) from 30,394,-572,000 (\$407,237,000) in 1957, cigars to 319,595,000 (\$22,518,000) from 283.-706,000 (\$20,442,000), fine cut smoking tobacco to 18,661,000 pounds (\$48,324,-000) from 18,011,000 (\$45,109,000) and coarse cut smoking tobacco to 2,721,000 pounds (\$6,958,000) from 2,595,000 (\$6,461,000). Consumption Of Cigarettes Tax-paid withdrawals of cigarettes for consumption in Canada, as indicated by the sale of excise revenue stamps, increased in this year's January-September period to 24,821,501,000 from 24,277,154,000 in 1958's comparable period. Nine-month withdrawals of cigars declined to 218,585,000 from 232,498,000, plug tobacco to 875,000 pounds from 934,000 and raw leaf to 740,000 pounds from 761,000, while cut tobacco rose to 16,420,000 pounds from 16,080,000 and snuff to 597,000 pounds from 572,-000.

Stocks of unmanufactured tobacco at the end of September this year reached a high for the date of 179,611,401 pounds, up 10.8% from last year's corresponding total of 162,040,648 pounds. End-of-September stocks were larger than a year earlier for flue-cured, burley and "other" tobaccos, but smaller for dark (air-fire cured), cigar and pipe tobaccos. Totals: flue-cured, 158,410,882 pounds (141,929,312 at September 30 last year); burley, 10,979,411 (7,681,163); air-fire cured, 1,589,290 (1,808,863); cigar, 7,292,019 (9,442,845); pipe, 586,-365 (1,145,339); and "other" tobaccos, 753,434 (33,126). while shipments of fine cut smoking tobacco and coarse cut smoking tobacco were also larger than in 1957. Total value of factory shipments in 1958, excluding duties and taxes, rose 7.7% to an all-time high of \$196,948,000 from 1957's previous peak of \$182,795,000.

D.B.S. NEWS NOTES

Filter Tips Canadian manufacturers of tobacco and tobacco products paid \$4,064,000 for filter tips and filter tip materials in 1958, an increase of 26% over the preceding year's \$3,218,000.

Cigarette Paper Some 3,373,800 pounds of cigarette paper were used by manufacturers of tobacco and tobacco products in 1958, an increase of 10% over the preceding year's 3,062,500.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 130 publications which present the results of the 1958 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. An annual Census of Manufactures has been carried out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since 1916.

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1958, are as follows:

Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis. Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory. Sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees, wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture, shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

Employees

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, warehousing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc., are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same. Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants of reporting companies

for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

Factory Shipments

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

Value Added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished

goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

Standard Industrial Classification

The Standard Industrial Classification Manual, prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, provides for 135 three-digit industries in the manufacturing sector, arranged in 17 major groups. Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

Short Forms

Prior to 1949 all manufacturing firms, regardless of size, were required to complete a standard form annually covering all census details, but for later years an effort was made to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms which usually do not maintain regular records in the required detail. A modified or short form was introduced in 1949 asking for the total value of shipments only, or in industries with a large number of small firms, for total value of shipments and quantities and values of a few principal products. Using the ratio of value of shipments in the current year to value of shipments in the base year, 1948, estimates of other census data were made for each plant for inclusion in the regular compilations. In general, the cut-off point for short forms was set at \$50,000 gross value of shipments annually, but there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the small firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. About 40 per cent of the total number of establishments reported on the modified or short form. They accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value. In 1958, to establish a new base year, the small firms were again asked to report data on employees, salaries and wages, and other principal statistics together with some detail on material and products.

SYMBOLS

The interpretation of the symbols used in the tables throughout this publication is as follows:

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of ''gross domestic product at factor cost'', it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. THE TOBACCO AND TOBACCO PRODUCTS INDUSTRIES 1958

The tobacco industries in Canada perform two distinct operations, and this report is separated into two sections accordingly. Section 1 covers the operations of all firms engaged in the manufacture

of smoking and chewing tobacco, snuff, cigars and cigarettes. Section 2 deals with the preliminary operations, which consist of the processing and packing of raw leaf tobacco.

SECTION 1. TOBACCO PRODUCTS

The value of shipments of the tobacco products industry in 1958 amounted to \$196,947,716 (excise duties and taxes excluded) which was \$14,153,152 greater than the 1957 value of \$182,794,564.

The increase in value of shipments was accompanied by an increase in the cost of materials consumed in manufacture from \$100,293,925 in 1957 to \$108,871,666 in 1958. The monthly payrolls listed an average 8,476 persons in 1958 compared with 8,372 in 1957. Salaries and wages which totalled \$29,349,732 in 1957 increased to \$32,144,308 in 1958. Establishments numbered 25, compared to 33 the year before, and were distributed provincially as follows: Prince Edward Island 2, Quebec 16, and Ontario 7,

The selling value of the products shipped by the industry in 1958, including excise duties and taxes, amounted to \$522,529,282. Shipments of cigarettes, the industry's main product, totalled 32,777,573 thousand valued at \$439,366,706. Next in importance was smoking tobacco (except plug type) with shipments amounting to 21,423,799 pounds worth \$55,311,960. Shipments of other commodities in order of importance were as follows: cigars, 319,595 thousand valued at \$22,518,284.

The tobacco industry contributes materially to the agricultural economy of Canada. Of the total cost of materials used, amounting to \$108,871,666 \$73,959,119 was spent for domestic raw leaf tobacco. All told, the tobacco industry consumed 96,032,777 pounds of raw leaf tobacco in 1958 of which 93,389,559 pounds were of domestic origin. For the production of cigars 1,285,468 pounds of imported and 4,276,531 pounds of domestic tobacco were used; for the production of cigarettes 1,286,592 pounds imported and 68,433,962 pounds of domestic tobacco were required, while for the production of smoking and chewing tobacco and snuff 71,158 pounds of imported and 20,679,066 pounds of domestic tobacco were used.

A compilation of statistics showing opening and closing inventory values, is shown in Table 11.

In 1954, value of factory shipments replaced value of production and opening and closing inventory valuations were collected for the first time. For 1954 and 1955 value of production was computed by using the value of shipments plus or minus the change in finished goods inventories. From 1956 to 1958, the change in goods in process inventory was also taken into account. When value of production was thus determined, value added by manufacture was arrived at by subtracting cost of raw materials and of fuel and electricity. The following statistical table for the period 1953-58 inclusive illustrates this procedure.

SECTION 2. TOBACCO PROCESSING AND PACKING

This section of the tenacco industry deals with the primary operations of processing the green raw leaf into a state suitable to undergo the final stage of conversion into the finished article in the form of smoking and chewing tobacco, cigars and cigarettes. During the year 1958 reports were received from 15 establishments, 5 of which were located in the province of Quebec and 10 in Ontario, Principal statistics for this section of the industry, are shown in Table 1.

The amount of raw leaf tobacco processed during the year 1958 was 160,225,608 pounds with a selling value of \$108,190,920 compared with 109,737,052 pounds processed in 1957 with a selling value of \$66,939,792. The principal variety of processed raw leaf was "bright flue-cured" of which 147,274,056 pounds were prepared with a valuation of \$100,816,356. The quantity and selling value of all tobacco processed is shown by kinds, for Canada and the provinces in Table 2.

The materials used in this section of the tobacco industry are given by provinces in Table 3. The raw leaf tobacco used in 1958 to produce the 160,225.608 pounds of processed leaf was 190,185,897 pounds. The expenditure incurred in providing the necessary containers and other packaging material and supplies amounted to \$1,577,967.

Contrary to the general change to the "gross value of shipments" concept throughout manufacturing industries in 1954, this industry remained on a "value of production" basis. This policy was adopted because, being dependent upon agricultural output, processed year-end inventories of leaf tobacco change extensively from year to year. Thus "Value added by manufacture" in this segment is determined simply by subtracting the total of the cost of raw materials and of fuel and electricity from the "gross value of production". The following statistical summary for the period 1953 to 1958 illustrates this procedure:
