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The Acting Commissioner of the Minister of Labour re cost of Living has issued the regular monthly statement as to quantities of food held in Cold Storage in Canada as of January 1st 1918. The term "Sold Storage" is not used in a technical sense. The figures below include dairy products, pickled and barrelled as well as frozen meats and the holdings of practically all the large fish Companies of Canada.

The quantity on hand the first of January 1918, and the first of December 1917, are as follows:-



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


