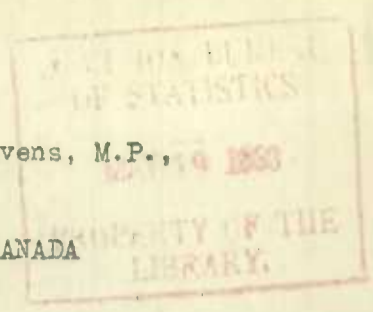

ADVANCE REPORT ON THE CONCENTRATED MILK PLANTS OF CANADA, 1932.

Number of Factories. - There were 26 concentrated milk factories in operation in Canada in 1932. The factories so classified are those whose chief items of production come under the general head of "concentrated milk", i.e., condensed milk, evaporated milk, milk powder, etc. The industry is centred in the province of Ontario, which has 23 of the total of 26 plants in operation last year. Of the remainder, two are located in British Columbia and one in Nova Scotia.

Deliveries of Milk and Cream. - The milk delivered at these factories during the year 1932 amounted to 254,677,396 pounds, for which the patrons received the sum of \$2,176,795. The cream delivered had a total butter fat content of 591,158 pounds, for which the patrons received \$124,727. The average number of patrons (farmers who supply milk and cream to dairy factories) of concentrated milk plants in 1932 was 6,547.

Employees and Salaries and Wages. - The number of salaried employees (managers, superintendents, professional and clerical employees) in the industry in 1932 was 208, and the number of wage-earners 537, making a total of 745 employees, compared with a total of 779 in 1931. The salaries and wages paid amounted to \$968,948, compared with \$982,984 in the preceding year.

Production. - Combining all items of production the total quantity in 1932 is shown as 80,975,345 pounds, compared with a total of 83,597,090 pounds in 1931, while the total value was \$7,392,897, compared with \$8,754,002 in the preceding year. The chief items of production in 1932 were evaporated milk with a total value of \$3,407,175 and condensed milk valued at \$1,221,618. An increase in quantity compared with the preceding year is shown for evaporated milk, but a decrease is recorded for condensed milk.

It should be noted that the present report deals with concentrated milk plants only, and the production figures do not include the comparatively small quantities of condensed and evaporated milk, milk powder, etc., made in creameries.

ARTICLE I
