The present report covers only the industries comprised in the "Vegetable Products Group". Statistics relating to specific products are, therefore, not to be regarded as the total for Canada since some of the commodities listed here are also produced in industries grouped under other classifications.

Also, this report does not cover all food products but only such food products as are of vegetable origin. Food products of animal origin are grouped in the "Animal Products Group" which is treated separately.

Commencing with 1936, "aerated waters" are included in the "Vegetable Products Group" and all figures have been revised in accordance with this change. Statistics published prior to 1936 are for this reason not comparable with those contained in the present report.

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#### THE VEGETABLE PRODUCTS GROUP, 1936

The importance of the vegetable products group in Canadian manufacture is indicated by the fact that in 1936 this group ranked first in gross value of production and cost of materials used, third in capital invested and fourth in the number of persons employed and salaries and wages paid.

In 1936 reports were received from 5,824 establishments with a capital investment of \$524,164,493 in fixed and current assets. The employment reported totalled 87,081 persons who received \$84,397,961 in salaries and wages. Products made were valued at \$597,461,635, materials used cost \$333,562,766 and the value added by manufacture amounted to \$254,135,013.

Considerable progress was made by the group as a whole during 1936. Compared with the previous year, there was an increase of \$73,787,708 or 14.1 per cent in the gross value of production, 6.0 per cent in the number of persons employed and 8.5 per cent in the amount of salaries and wages paid. The value added by manufacture, out of which must come the manufacturers' selling and overhead expenses as well as his profits, advanced 12.0 per cent. Capital investment showed an increase of 3.0 per cent.

From the standpoint of production the flour and feed milling industry was the leading one of the group in 1936. This is one of Canada's oldest industries and it has taken care of the domestic requirements for more than three hundred years. The mills, which include many of the most modern type and highest efficiency, have attained a capacity far beyond local demand and for their surplus production have obtained a market in all parts of the world where wheat flour is consumed. This movement reached its peak in 1928 when 10,737,266 barrels valued at \$63,973,066 were exported. In 1936, 4,850,071 barrels worth \$20,638,718 were shipped. It may be noted, also, that this industry is of considerable importance to the agricultural economy of Canada since materials used, which cost \$90,614,236 in 1936, are mostly of Canadian origin.

Reports were received in 1936 from 1,118 flour and feed mills. These mills reported a gross value of production of \$114,617,099 and a capital investment of \$61,867,287. They furnished employment to 5,685 persons who were paid \$5,542,945 in salaries and wages and spent \$90,614,236 for materials. Compared with the previous year, there were increases in all major items of principal statistics, as follows: gross value of production, \$17,049,231 or 18 per cent; cost of materials used, \$12,542,569 or 16 per cent; number of persons employed, 231 or 4 per cent; salaries and wages paid, \$377,438 or 7 per cent and capital invested, \$5,391,972 or 9 per cent.

The alcoholic beverages industry, including breweries, distilleries and wineries, has continued its expansion until now it stands second in value of production in the vegetable products group. In 1936 reports were received from 134 establishments, reporting a gross value of production of \$67,005,879, which was an increase of \$7,040,240 or 12 per cent over the value of all products in 1935. The amount of capital invested, \$100,904,654, declined by \$6,405,278 or 6 per cent. There were 7,134 persons given employment in 1936, an increase of 473 or 7 per cent over the previous year, and the salary and wage bill, \$9,515,685, showed an increase

of \$800,095 or 9 per cent. The cost of raw materials in 1936 was \$21,584,822, an increase of \$2,048,881 or 10 per cent.

The bread and other bakery products industry ranked third in importance from the standpoint of value of production in 1936 when 3,101 establishments reported goods produced to the value of \$65,558,437, which was an increase of \$6,157,769 or 10 per cent as compared with 1935. Capital investment, \$46,108,482, showed an increase of \$2,319,558 or 5 per cent. Employment was furnished to 19,598 persons, an increase of 431 or 2 per cent and salaries and wages paid amounted to \$17,703,572, an increase of \$1,333,660 or 8 per cent. The cost of materials used in 1936 was \$32,124,708, an increase of \$3.781,163 or 13 per cent.

The rubber industry, which is of considerable importance in the industrial life of Canada, is also included in the vegetable products group of industries. In 1936, 50 establishments reported a gross value of production amounting to \$\frac{1}{2}\$\$ \$62,054,808, an increase over 1935 of \$6,105,238 or 11 per cent. The amount of capital invested was \$64,600,479, an increase of \$1,164,681 or 2 per cent. Employment was furnished to 11,881 persons, 858 or 8 percent more than in 1935. They were paid \$11,954,016 in salaries and wages, which represented an increase of \$936,585 or 9 per cent. The cost of all materials used was \$23,598,661, an increase of \$3,339,887 or 16 per cent. This industry forms an adjunct of considerable importance to the cotton yarn and cloth industry which supplies it with tire fabrics for canvas boots and shoes. The export market is also of importance and in 1936 shipments abroad were valued at \$14,105,888. In that year Canada ranked seventh in imports of raw rubber.

In the fruit and vegetable canning, evaporating, preserving, pickling, etc industry, 304 establishments reported operations in 1936. They had a gross value of production of \$47,337,397 which was \$9,060,910 or 24 per cent above the 1935 production. The capital investment, \$41,572,514, showed an increase of \$3,300,135 or 9 per cent. Employment was given to 9,258 persons, an increase of 1,346 or 17 per cent, the salaries and wages, \$6,066,761, increased by \$1,003,280 or 20 per cent, while the cost of materials used, \$27,455,449, increased by \$5,202,623 or 23 per cent.

The manufacture of biscuits, confectionery, cocoa, chocolate and chewing gum has developed into an important industry and in 1936 the 206 establishments engaged in such manufactures reported a gross value of production of \$46,051,641. This was \$4,853,808 or 12 per cent higher than in 1935. Capital investment amounted to \$39,802,756, an increase of \$2,023,437 or 5 per cent. Employment was furnished to 11,201 persons, 755 or 7 per cent more than in the previous year, and the amount of salaries and wages paid, \$10,101,275, was an increase of \$785,712 or 8 per cent. The cost of materials used was \$22,191,155, an increase of \$2,959,966 or 15 per cent.

The 10 sugar refineries operating in Canada in 1936 had a gross value of production of \$40,405,377. This represented an increase over 1935 of \$3,807,380 or 10 per cent. The amount of capital invested, \$33,199,993, was an increase of \$182,119 or less than one per cent. Employment was given to 2,559 persons, 425 or 20 per cent more than in 1935, and the salaries and wages paid, amounting to \$3,413,698, represented an increase of \$327,007 or 11 per cent. The cost of all materials used in 1936 was \$27,924,998, an increase of \$2,787,430 or 11 per cent.

In presenting production values for the manufacture of tobacco, smoking and chewing, snuff, cigars and cigarettes, the Bureau has found it advisable to deduct excise taxes paid, since the inclusion of these taxes enhances the importance of this industry considerably beyond the point warranted by either the amount of employment furnished or the salaries and wages paid. It should be noted, also, that the following figures do not include the preliminary operations which consist of the processing and packing of raw leaf tobacco.

The 95 establishments reporting in 1936 had a production value of \$40,287,359, an increase of \$1,183,484 over the previous year and the cost of materials used, \$20,111,289, was also greater by \$409,904. Employment, 7,593 persons, and salaries and wages paid, \$7,207,737, showed decreases of 552 persons and \$13,311. Capital invested amounted to \$58,785,097, an increase of \$606,584.

Reports were received from 92 establishments in the coffee, tea and spice industry for the year 1936, advising a gross value of production of \$26,412,092, this being an advance of \$2,197,331 or 9 per cent over the 1935 figures. The amount of capital invested, \$13,347,535, showed a decrease of \$83,660 or less than one per cent. The 2,086 persons employed represented a decrease of 32 or 1.5 per cent and salaries and wages paid, amounting to \$2,364,413, decreased by \$172,664 or 7 per cent. The cost of materials used in 1936, \$19,140,291, was an increase of \$1,596,983 or 9 per cent.

The principal statistics for 1935 and 1936 of all industries comprised in the vegetable products group are contained in tables 4 and 5.

In accordance with the recommendations of the Conference of British Commonwealth Statisticians, 1935, the net value of production, or value added by manufacture, is now computed by subtracting the cost of materials and the value of fuel and electricity from the gross value of products. However, since the value of electricity is not available prior to 1924, the net values as shown for the years preceding that date are still computed by the old method of subtracting the cost of materials only.
