HANDLES, SPOOLS AND WOOD-TURNING

1931 - 1932.

Ottawa, November, 1932.— A report has recently been issued by the Forestry Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics dealing with the manufacture of handles, spools and other wood-turning in Canada in 1931 and 1932. This report gives details concerning firms which specialize in the production of these commodities and covers the greater part of their production in Canada. There are, however, a number of firms classified under other industrial groups which make handles, spools and turnery as a side-line or by-product to their principal production.

In 1932 there were 34 plants included in the wood-turning industry. Sixteen were located in Ontario, fourteen in Quebec, three in British Columbia, and one in Nova Scotia.

The total capital invested was \$1,422,887 as against \$1,822,744 in 1931. The value placed on lands, buildings and fixtures was \$852,661; inventories of stocks and materials were placed at \$286,060; finished products on hand at \$145,097, and cash, trading and operating accounts at \$139,069.


During the year the wood-turning industry gave employment to 68 salaried employees and to an average of 398 wage-earners, or a total of 466 workers as against 502 in 1931. Payments for salaries and wages totalled \$338,775 as compared with \$388,669 in the previous year.

The manufacturers of handles, spools and wood turnery purchased fuel to the value of \$4,420 of which \$536 was spent in bituminous coal. Most of the fuel used was wood waste, from the factories themselves, which was of little or no commercial value. The total power employed was 2,469 H.P., most of which was generated by electric motors operated on purchased power and steam engines burning the waste referred to above.

Sawn lumber, the greater part of which was hardwood made up the largest item of the raw materials used, amounting to 4,926 M ft. b.m., valued at \$148,469. Hardwood bolts were purchased to the value of \$67,663. Veneer and other materials made up the total of \$371,392.

The principal products manufactured in the order of their importance as far as value is concerned were spools, bobbins and shuttles \$388,800, axe and long tool handles \$171,643, small tool handles \$59,135, broom and mop handles \$50,216, dowels \$9,864, baseball bats \$1,382 and all other wood-turning \$103,061. In addition to these principal products the industry also manufactured as secondary products sporting goods, vehicle supplies, planing mill products, woodenware, and a number of other miscellaneous items bringing the total gross value of production to \$901,173.

The following tables include a comparative summary of the principal statistics of the industry for the calendar years 1931 and 1932 followed by comparative tables giving the details of the distribution of establishments, capital invested, employment, fuel used, power employed, materials used and products manufactured.





