Woouenware, 1925 and 1926
Ottawa iarch, $1928,-$ A preliminary report on the manufacture of moodenware in Canada ouring 3725 end 1926 has recently been issued by the Forest Products Branck of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The report gives the production of fims sociaissing in wondenware and covers the greater part of its production in Canada. There are however a number of other firms classified in other industrial sroups which nake woodenware as a side line or byproduct. The fims dealt with in the present report also manufacture comodities other than moodenware as secondary products.

There wese 11 woodenware factories in operation in Canada in 1926 of which 5 were in Ontario, $\bar{j}$ in Qrebec, $巴$ in Nova Scotia and one in British Columbia. The capital invested in tiae industry increased from \$737,466 in 1925 to $\$ 778,630$ in 1926, the total number of employees increased from 428 to 450 and the distribution of wages and salaries increased from $\$ 282,431$ to $\$ 324,587$. The raw materials used increased in total cost from $\$ 244,822$ to $\$ 260,998$ while the gross value of production increased from $\$ 711,225$ in 1925 to $\$ 731,892$ in 1926.

Logs and sawn lumber to the anount of $5,355 \mathrm{M} \mathrm{ft.b.ra}$, valued at $\$ 151,600$ and 4,200 nonds of bolts valued at $\$ 46,212$ were the principal raw materials of the industry.

The tern "woodenware" is rather indefinite in its use and in this report it applies ir. general ray to articles made almost ontirely of wood and used in kitchens, balaries. Aarifies etc. The principal products in 1926 in the order of their importace as far as value is concerned were, pails and tubs $\$ 323,685$, clothespins $\$ 98,875$, wsshbonrds $\$ 51,003$, toothpicks $\$ 11,643$, skevers $\$ 9,317$, ladders $\$ 6,032$, and miscallaneous woodenware $\$ 3,000$. The secondiry products of the industry include baskets and erates, butter boxes, cheese boxes, sportine goods and furmiture es woll as a number of other items.

Out of a total of $\$ 775,630$ of capital employed in $1926 \$ 490,142$ was invested in land, buildins and fixtures, $\$ 160,405$ in materials and stocks and $\$ 125,083$ in cash rocounts and other working capital.

Out of 450 enaployees 397 vere males, 384 being wawe earners and 13 paid on a salary basis. of the 53 females umployed 52 were de firntre and one was a salaried employee.

Woodenware manufacturers bought comparatively little fuel, their total purchases amountine to only $\$ 1: 366$. The power used in the industry amounted to $905 \mathrm{~F} . \mathrm{P}$. nost of which was generated by steam engines using wood waste as fuel.

The following tables give: first, a sumary of the principal statistics of the induecry in $12: 5$ und ly followed by comparative detailed tables for both years covering the aistribution of establishments, materials used, carital employed, wrotucts and by-products mamfactured, employment, fuel, and power.
