# THE BED, SPRING AND MATTRESS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1925 and 1926

Ottawa, February, 1928. An initial report on the above named industry for the calendar years 1925 and 1926 is presented herewith. The number of individual concerns reporting in 1925 was 56 while in 1926 the number was 55. The location of plants by provinces for the years 1925 and 1926 was respectively; Ontario 28 and 25, Quebec 14 and 15, Alberta 4 and 4, Manitoba 3 and 3, British Columbia 3 and 3, Nova Scotia 3 and 3, and New Brunswick 1 and 2. Statistics of the plants located in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are combined throughout the report to avoid disclosure of information concerning individual plants.

#### Principal Statistics

The following table presents the principal statistics of the industry for the calendar years 1925 and 1926. A column showing the increase  $(\frac{1}{2})$  or decrease  $(\frac{1}{2})$  of the statistical items has been added to complete the table.

A table showing comparative statistics covering the period from the inception of the annual census to date is appended. Production reached its highest point in 1919, the last year of high war expenditures from which date the value fluctuated from year to year reaching the next high point in 1926 the last year covered in the present report.

# THE BED, SPRING AND MATTRESS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1925 and 1926.

## Size of Establishments

In view of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the bed, spring and mattress industry in Canada measured by (a) capital investment (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed, all within certain groups or limitations for the calendar years 1925 and 1926. The movement of capital production and employment within these groups, is also indicated.

In 1925, the total number of plants reporting was 56, with a total capital investment of \$6,470,690 a gross value of production of \$7,521,810 and a total employment of 1,315. Six establishments had an investment of \$4,921,640, seven others had a gross production value of \$5,555,482 whilst four establishments had a total employment of 691. The average capital investment of the 56 plants was \$115,448 and of the six plants \$820,273; the average gross value of production in the 56 plants was \$134,318 and in the seven plants the average was \$793,640; while in employment the average for the 56 plants was 23.5 and for the four plants was 122.

In 1926, the total number of plants reporting was 55 with a total capital investment of \$6,597,910, a gross value of production of \$8,139,570 and a total employment of 1,410. Six establishments had an investment of \$4,954,326, eight a production of \$6,117,595 and three an employment of 635. The average capital invested in the 55 plants was \$119,692 and of the six plants \$825,554; the average gross value of production in the 55 plants was \$147,992 and in the eight plants \$764,699 whilst in employment the average of the 55 plants was 25.6 and of the three plants was 212.

# Production Statistics

The statistics of production for the calendar years 1925 and 1926 are shown in Table 1, by quantity and selling value at the factory wherever available. The increase in production over 1925 was \$617,760 the provinces mainly contributing to this result being in order, Manitoba \$254,280, Ontario \$185,033 and Quebec \$138,547. The province of Quebec however leads in total value of production followed by Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia, Alberta and the Maritime Provinces in the order named.

## Capital investment

Table 2 presents statistics of capital investment for the Dominion and the provinces for the calendar years 1925 and 1926. Fixed capital increased by \$141,973 during the two year period whilst working capital decreased by \$14,753, leaving a net increase for the period of \$127,220. The province of Quebec leads in total capital invested during both years with Ontorio in second place and Manitoba in third place.

Employment Statistics

Statistics of employment are presented in the following series of tables. Table 3 shows the number employed during the year by sex and remuneration by provinces, table 4 the number of wage-earners by months according to sex with totals and averages and table 5 the operating time of plants and employees during the year.

Whilst the number of salaried employees during the two-year period increased by only 1, the amount paid in salaries increased by \$25,233. The number of wage-earners increased by 94 and the amount paid in wages also increased by \$139,823. The average annual salary irrespective of sex rose from \$2,233.16 in 1925 to \$2,335.80 in 1926 or a per cent increase of 4.6, whilst the average wage per employee during the period increased from \$1,040.80 in 1925 to \$1,076.15 in 1926 or 3.4 per cent.

All of the provinces show increases over 1925 in the number of wage-earners at employment, totalling 94 of which Quebec accounted for 40, Manitoba for 27, Ontario for 17 British Columbia for 5, Alberta for 3 and Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for 2.

Working time - The operating time of plants and employees is shown in table 5 for the years 1925 and 1926. Operating time of plants is shown under 3 heads:- full time, part time and idle, whilst that of wage-earning employees is shown by the day and the week. Plant operations show considerable variation in the two-year period being highest in 1925 when they were idle on an averag of 15.25 days per plant as compared with 17.98 days in 1926. In working time of employees there is a gradual increase both in daily and weekly hours of labour.

## Fuel Consumntion

The quantity and the cost value delivered at the factory of the various classes of fuel used and of electricity purchased is shown in table 6. Coal is the principal fuel used and constituted over 53 per cent of the total cost of fuel. The cost of fuel and electricity purchased for all purposes declined from \$56,390 in 1925 to \$77,261 in 1926.

# THE BID, SPRING AND MATTRESS INDUSTRY IN CANADA 1925 and 1926. Power Installation

Power installed in the bed, spring and mattress industry is shown in table 7 for the calendar years 1925 and 1926 by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horsepower according to the manufacturer's rating. Power developed for manufacturing purposes shows little variation during the two-year period. The decrease in electric power in 1926 is due to one concern which reported in 1925 having coased operations in 1926.

Boiler installation for each of the years is also shown in the table.

 $\underline{\text{Materials Used}}.$  Owing to changes in the schedule, the individual items of materials used in the industry were not collected, only a total value of such materials being required for 1925. The collection of such statistics was resumed in 1926 and are shown in table 8 by quantity and value. The total cost of all materials used in 1925 was \$3,987,886 whilst in 1926 it had increased to \$4,178,874, an increase of \$190,938 or approximately 5 per cent. The total cost of materials by provinces was as follows: Quebec \$1,641,020, Ontario \$1,292,853, Manitoba \$877,490, British Columbia \$207,385, Alberta \$95,397 and Nova Scotia& New Brunswick \$64,729.

Imports:- The value of imports for consumption in Canada during the calendar year 1925 and 1926 is shown in table 9 by principal countries. The value of imports decreased in 1926 by \$12,176 or about 50 per cent.

Exports: - The value of emorts of Canadian produce during the calendar years 1925 and 1926 is shown by principal countries in table 10. The value of exports increased over 1926 by \$14,183 or 52.7 per cent.
