THE BED, SPRING AND MATTRESS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1930

Ottawa, November, 1931. A report on the above named industry for the calendar year 1930 is presented herewith. The number of individual concerns reporting in 1930 was 61. The location of plants by provinces was: Ontario 32, Quebec 15, Alberta 3; Manitoba 4, British Columbia 3, Nova Scotia 2 and New Brunswick 2. Statistics of the plants located in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are combined throughout the report to avoid disclosure of information concerning individual plants.

Principal Statistics.

The following table presents the principal statistics of the industry for the calendar years 1929 and 1930. A column showing the increase (+) or decrease (-) of the statistical items has been added to complete the table.

Comparative Statistics

A table showing comparative statistics covering the period from the inception of the annual census to date is appended. Production in the industry reached its highest point in 1929 having increased during the period covered by the annual census, (1917-1929) by \$6,398,935 or approximately 142 per cent.

Size of Establishments

In view of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the bed, spring and mattress industry in Canada measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed. The movement of capital, production and employment within these groups is also indicated.

In 1930 the total number of plants reporting was 61 with a total capital investment of \$8,255,703 a gross value of production of \$8,032,661 and a total employment of 1,734. Nine establishments had an investment of \$6,303,266, ten a production of \$5,356,063 and four an employment of 710. The average capital invested in the 61 plants was \$135,339 and of the 9 plants \$700,363 the average gross value of production in the 61 plants was \$131,683 and in the 10 plants \$535,606, whilst in employment the average of the 61 plants was 28 and of the four plants was 177.

Production Statistics

The statistics of production for the calendar year 1930 are shown in Table 1, by quantity and selling value at the factory wherever available. The decrease in production over 1929 was \$2,874,042. The province of Ontario leads in total value of production followed by Quebec, Manitoba, British Columbia, Alberta and the Maritime Provinces in the order named.

Materials used

The quantity and cost value of the principal materials used in the industry are shown by provinces in Table 2. The total cost of all materials used declined from \$5,545,242 in 1929 to \$4,111,434 in 1930 a decrease of \$1,433,808.

Capital Investment

Table 3 presents statistics of capital investment for the Dominion and the provinces for the calendar year 1930. Fixed capital decreased by \$9,292 during the two year period and working capital decreased by \$622,914 making a total decrease for the period of \$632,206. The province of Quebec leads in total capital invested with Ontario second, and Manitoba in third place.

Employment Statistics

Statistics of employment are presented in the following series of tables. Table 4 shows the number employed during the year by sex and remuneration by provinces, Table 5 the number of wage-earners by months according to sex with totals and averages.

The number of salaried employees during the two-year period decreased by 38 the amount paid in salaries decreased by \$126,237. The number of wage-earners decreased by 164 and the amount paid in wages also decreased by \$304,051. The average annual salary irrespective of sex fell from \$2,461 in 1929 to \$2,531 in 1930, whilst the average wage per employee fell from \$1,075 in 1929 to \$989. in 1930.

Fuel Consumption

The quantity and the cost value delivered at the factory of the various classes of fuel used and of electricity purchased is shown in Table 6. Coal is the principal fuel used and constituted over 47 per cent of the total cost of fuel. The cost of fuel and electricity purchased for all purposes fell from \$114,283 in 1929 to \$94,374 in 1930.

Power Installation

Power installed in the bed, spring and mattress industry is shown in Table 7 for the calendar years 1929 and 1930 by (a) classes of power, (b) number of units in each class and (c) the horsepower according to manufacturer's rating. Power developed for manufacturing purposes shows an increase of 38 rated horsepower during the two-year period.
