THE BED, SPRING AND MATTRESS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1933.

A report on the bed, spring and mattress industry in Canada for the year 1933 is presented herewith.

Reports were received from sixty establishments which were located by provinces as follows: - Nova Scotia two, New Brunswick two, Quebec sixteen, Ontario thirty-one, Manitoba four, Alberta one and British Columbia four. To avoid disclosure of information concerning individual establishments, statistics for the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have been combined. Similar procedure has been adopted in the case of Manitoba and Alberta.

The principal products of the industry in the order of their importance as represented by the total selling value were as follows: - mattresses \$2,450,832, bed springs \$719,592, metal beds \$491,968, metal couches \$215,623, cushions \$158,701, pillow \$119,771 and metal cribs \$44,055. The production of these articles must not be considered as representing their total output in Canada as most of them are also manufactured in furniture and upholstering establishments, etc., and, therefore, cannot be included in this report.

The sixty factories represented a total capital investment of \$5,533,309, the total number of persons employed was 1,498 and their salaries and wages amounted to \$1,494,043. The amount expended for all materials used was \$2,646,963, whilst the selling value of the products was \$4,860,594 the sum of \$2,213,631 represents the value added by the process of manufacture.

Considerable decreases were recorded over the previous year. Capital investment declined \$71,838, employees 13, salaries and wages \$115,751 and the value added by manufacture \$45,147. However, materials increased by \$320,526 and the value of products by \$275,379.

Detailed statistics of production, materials used, capital, employment, fuel and power consumption, imports and exports will be found in the following tables.




