WHAKLY INDEX NUMBERS OF WHOLESALE PRICES, 1934
(1926-100)
The Dominion Bureau of Statistics index number of wholesale prices on the base $1926-100$ fell from 71.5 for the woek ending October 12 , to 71.4 for the weak ending October 19. Fine silver reached a high for the year whon a price of 53.1 cents per ounce was reported. Recessions occurred in grains, millod products and sugars, and gains werc rogistered for dairy products, vogetablc oils and the majority of non-ferrous metals.

Vegetable products cased from 67.3 to 66.6 duo principally to weakness in sugar and grains. Flour and Milled Products also receded slightly while amall advances were noted in corn, vegetable oils, and. raw rubber. Price changes in the Animal group were fairly numerous and tho index rose from 66.3 to 67.4 . Hides and skins firmed but leather and boots and shoes werc down. In the livestock section botter prices were reported for veal, hoge and lambs but thesc were morc than offset by weokness in steers. Eggs and milk gained but new checse dropped half a cent. Oils and fats showed strength as did bacon hogs at Toronto and Montrcal but curod meats at Winnipog were lower. The index for Wood Products foll from 65.5 to 65.3 , lower prices for spruce deals jeing chiefly responsible. The increase from 86.6 to 86.7 in Iron and Its Products was largoly a reflection of exchange conditions. The index for Non-f otrous Mctals rose from 61.8 to 62.4. Copper, antimony and silver were higher while lead sheded off slightly. Chemicals and Aliied Products decreased from 82.0 to 80.9 , principally bocause of reduced prices for soaps and taming materials. Textiles and Non-metallic Minerals remained unchanged at 72.5 and 86.3 rospectively.

Canadian Farm Products advanced from 60.0 to 61.1 , increases in dalry products being of more importance than losses in grains.
