## WHEKLY INDHX NUMBERS OF WHOLESLIE PRICES, 1939-1240

Industrial Material prices continued buoyant in the week ending April 19, and the Dominion Bureau of Statistical index, on the base August $1939=100$, rose from 122.7 for the week ending April 12 to $i 23.4$. Mirmer quotatians for unbleached sulphite puip raised the Stable group from 112.4 to 112 . While Manufacturing Materials advanced from 127.7 to 128.2 , when increases in raw rubber, rouj.n and hemp outweighed a decrease in raw silk. Food Materials ralliod following a two weok decline, and moved from 236.8 to 139.1, as both grains and iivestock displayed firmness.

The General Tholesale Comodity index remained at 83.2. This index has been unohanged since the week of March 22, and atits present level is approximately 13 p.c. above the corresponding week of last yoar. Of the eight major groups comprising the index, Vegetable producte, woud and Chemicals meved higher, while Animal products, Textiles, Iron and Non-Metallic Minorals receded. Some of the outstanding commoditios to advance wore grains, livestock, frogh moats and tin, but egge, raw silk, raw wool, rolling-mill products and coal corlinod.

Canadian Farm Products rose from 720 to 72,6 . Field Products moved from 64.6 to 65.5 , supported by grains, potatoes, onions and hay, and Animal products increased from 84.3 to 84.4 , as firmer quotations were shown for livestock, oggs and wool.
