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WAREHOUSTING

An annual survey of the warehousing industry has been published by the Bureau commencing with 1944 and presents data on the operations of the principal firms offering warehousing and storage facilities to the public across QUE Canada. The number of companies reporting for 1949 improved to 155 compared with 141 in 1948 and 129 for 1947. trade association of the industry has been most cooperative in encouraging members to file reports promptly but late returns still delay publication on a more current basis. Statistics given reveal a quite comprehensive analysis of operations by regions covering revenues, expenses, Let income, employment, salaries and wages, space, occupancy, etc. The Maritime Provinces have been grouped to prevent revealing individual returns. No reports were received from Mawfoundland.

The current edition includes returns from both members and non-members of the Canadian Warehousemen's Association who were doing a public warehousing business during the year. Cooperatives operating warehouses for their members were not included nor were packing houses and other firms operating storage facilities in connection with their respective businesses. Many warehousing companies also operated a local moving and cartage service and others operated a motor carrier business, including long distance moving. For some firms the revenue from the carrier business represented a large part of their total revenue and they should be more properly classed as motor carriers rather than as warehouse companies; however, the following tables show the revenue from each activity. The item "Other Revenues" contains some income from merchandising.

With the increased number of firms reporting, the total gross capital investment advanced from \$50,572,229 in 1948 to \$35,554,799 and the average per company was thus \$216,824 in 1948 and rose to \$229,386 in the year under review. The accrued depreciation was \$11,873,805, up from \$10,551,781 one year earlier. As shown in Table 1, operating revenues grossed \$20,003,675 for the year compared with \$18,838,195 in 1948. Most accounts advanced but storage revenue from household goods declined.

Operating expenses advanced more rapidly than revenues to reach \$17,182,216 against \$15,559,663 in 1948. The bettarment in revenues was thus \$1,165,482 while the expenses of doing business rose \$1,622,555 indicating that some upward revision in warehousing charges to the public was likely to meet rising costs. Although income tax was reduced, interest and other charges were heavier than in 1948 and the net income transferred to surplus was reduced from \$2,224,027 in 1948 to \$1,722,195 despite the increase of 14 in the number of firms reporting.

Revenues from storage contributed 49 p.c. of operating revenues and cartage and moving 28.6 p.c. Wages and bonuses represented 56.2 p.c. of operating expenses while administration and general took 18.5 p.c. Operating taxes and licences were up from \$545,785 to \$647,529.


The total salary and wage bill for the industry was \$8,553,583 compared with \$8,115,897 one year earlier. Employment was given to 1,029 salaried employees, 2,964 regular wage sarmers and a monthly average of 144 casuals or part time helpers - a total of 4,137 persons against 4,416 in 1948 or a reduction of 279. Average earnings of all classes of employees rose from \$1,838 to \$2,065 or by 12.3 p.c. The above are exclusive of withdrawals by owners or entrepreneurs.

While the industry as a whole enjoyed a fair year's operations, the volume of business averaged considerably less than in 1948 in most regions. With the greater availability of living accommodation, the demand was eased for household goods storage space, and the percentage of net occupiable space taken averaged lower than in 1948 and in any year back to 1944. Merchandise storage also declined from 1948 and averaged about 85.7 p.c. occupancy in 1949 against nearly 90 p.c. in the preceding year. Cold storage occupancy was likewise much lower at about 62 p.c. for the year whereas in 1948 the average was nearly 74 p.c. However, cold storage space available rose from 15,188,887 cubic feet in 1948 to 22,526,187 cubic feet in 1949 and explains the decline in average occupancy.

A revised method of industrial accident reporting shows 1 person killed and 249 injured during 1949. Reduction was shown from 1948 in the number of trucks while tractors and trailers increased. Part of the decrease in trucks was due to the separation of motor carrier operations. For comparative purposes only, a table follows which gives the salient statistics covering 127 identical firms reporting for both 1948 and 1949. As shown, declines were general in all items except salaries. Revenues dropped \$861,585 from \$17,817,650 to \$16,956,265 or by 4.8 p.c., while expenses were cut only \$241,483 to \$14,477,066 or 1.6 p.c., and net income decreased \$466,486 to \$1,611,314. Wage earners were reduced considerably and the total salary and wage bill was off from \$7,739,226 to \$7,354,817.
