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WARRHOUSING

1951

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The present report is the eighth in a series of annual surveys of the warehousing industry across Canada and gives the principal statistics covering the operations of the majority of the firms providing warehousing and storage facilities and service to the public. Returns from 167 companies were received for 1951 compared with 164 in 1950, 155 in 1949 and 141 in 1948. Continued cooperation has been forthcoming from the national association in an endeavour to expedits collection and publication but tardy reporting by a minority has again delayed release.

Statistics are published on a regional basis with the Maritime provinces as a group. Newfoundland is not yet represented. Reporte are included from both members and non-members of the Canadian Warehousemen's Association who conducted a public warehousing business during the year. Cooperatives and the like operating warehouses or storages for their own members are not covered nor were packing houses and other firms operating storage facilities in connection with their respective businesses which are reported to other divisions of the Bureau. Many public warehousing companies also operated a local moving and cartage service and others a motor carrier business, including long distance moving. For some firms revenues from motor carrier activities represent a large percentage of total receipts and they might better be classed as motor carrier rather than as warehousing firms; however, the tables below indicate the amount of revenue derived from each segment of their business. The account "Other Revenues" contains some income from serchandising. Small food locker plants are not included, except where they may be part of a general warehousing business.

A more encouraging financial result was secured from 1951 operations. With three more firms reporting, total investment as reflected in property account advanced from \$38,392,150 at the end of 1950 to \$39,641,574 due mainly to the addition of new equipment and vehicles. Accrued depreciation amounted to \$13,540,652 versus \$12,235,092 a year earlier.

Total operating revenues showed a splendid gain over 1950 at \$26,451,501 compared with \$21,834,057, up 21 p.c. or \$4,617,444. Household goods storage produced \$1,719,764 off \$89,000 from the previous year but all others accounts were higher. Dry merchandise storage earned \$4,469,877 versus \$3,785,477 while cold storage receipts improved \$65,365 to \$4,832,044. Cartage revenue was sharply greater advancing \$2,265,519 or 53.7 p.c. over 1950 to total \$5,824,475. Moving receipts improved \$612,923 rising to \$3,700,897 and other revenues increased from \$3,059,643 to \$3,756,955. Storage receipts provided but 41.6 p.c. of earnings compared with 47.5 p.c. of the 1950 total.

With rising costs for labour squipment and materials, and greater activity, operating expenses were up from \$18,853,495 to \$23,038,748, an increase of \$4,185,253 or 22,2 p.c. over 1950. All expense accounts registered advances. Administration and general expenses took \$648,330 more at \$4,236,216 while wages increased from \$6,815,136 to \$8,511,082 or 24.9 p.c. with employment higher. Maintenance and repairs expenses were appreciably higher particularly for motor vehicles. Fuels and other transportation charges rose from \$1,325,489 to \$1,701,023 while insurance and safety expenses, claims etc., increased by \$134,915 to \$637,219. Depreciation was up from \$1,105,597 to \$1,433,434. Operating taxes and licenses took \$853,621 against \$680,587 in 1950 as the vehicle flest of the industry increased. Other operating expenses including rents moved up from \$2,761,152 to \$3,160,161.

Gross income for 1951 was \$3,637,853 compared with \$3,107,688 in 1950, a betterment of 17 p.c. and is well above the \$2,929,403 reported for 1949 and \$3,434,656 in 1948. Interest payments were lower at \$251,881 versus \$348,729 in 1950. Income tax based on improved not income rose from \$756,210 to \$1,062,719. Not income transferred to surplus was an encouraging \$2,003,073 for the industry compared with \$1,706,245 in 1950, \$1,722,195 in 1949 and \$2,224,027 in 1948.

The net for the year 1951 represents a return of nearly 8 p.c. on the depreciated value of assets of \$26,100,922 as shown in Table 1. and compares with 6.5 p.c. on 1950 operations.

Total salary and wage payments in 1951 amounted to \$11,637,587 going to 1,150 salaried employees, 3,504 regular wage earners and a monthly average of 328 casuals. The total compares with \$9,586,171 paid to 1,095 on salary, 3,140 wage earners and 273 casuals during 1950. Average earnings for all classes of employees were thus \$2,336 against \$2,127 in 1950, a raise of 9.8 p.c. with employment up from 4,508 to 4,982,

Het occupiable space provided by the industry amounted to nearly 79,263,000 cubic feet in 1951 compared with a revised 78,314,000 in 1950. Space assigned to household goods declined from 19,333,375 to 17,787,385 cubic feet but merchandise space advanced from a revised 35,128,232 in 1950 to 37,457,144 cubic feet in 1951 as considerable household goods space was margined to merchandise. Cold etorage space was up from 23,852,576 cubic feet to 24,018,082. Occupancy estimates as at the first of each month show a drop in household goods and gains in merchandise and cold storage. The accident record for the industry reports one employee killed during 1951 against none in 1950 while 447 employees were injured compared with 352 a year earlier. No deathe were caused to other persons versus 4 in 1950.

For comparative purposes only, a special table is given below which summarises the key statistics for 185 firms which reported for both 1950 and 1951. These comparatives should not be confused with data shown in the main tables or cutlined above.
