## WAREHOUSING

## 1960

The following changes in the publication of data relating to the public warehousing and the intercity for hite motor carrier industries should be noted:

Prior to 1960 , firms engaged in both public warehousing and trucking activities were required to file semarate returns to cover each operation. However, a breakdown of financial data was not usually available. Firms were therefore allocated to a report on the basis of the predominant source of their annual gross operating revenues. Statistics for firms engaged primarily in public warehousing were published in the "Warehousing" report, catalogue no. 63-212, while data for companies which obtained the majority of their operating revenues from for hire intercity trucking were contained in the report "Motor Carriers - Freight", catalogue no. 53-205.

The majority of companies having both public warehousing and for hire trucking operations were found to be engaged primarily in household goods moving and storage.. As this activity, requiring specialized equipment, is considered to be a distinct industry, it was decided to present such information in a separate publication to be called "Moving and Storage, Household Goods", catalogue no. 53-221. As firms earning the predominant portion of their annual gross operating revenues from household goods storage are no longer contained in the "Warehousing" report its title has been changed to "Warehousing, General Merchandise and Refrigerated Goods", catalogue no. 63-212, to indicate more clearly what it contains. With the exclusion of household goods movers from the "Motor Carriers Freight" report, the title of this report is more appropriate and the data contained in it more meaningful.

The improvement in the presentation of data pertaining to public warehousing and for hire trucking described above is part of a continuing programme to increase the usefulness, coverage and accuracy of statistics relating to the various industries in the field of road transport.

As this publication is intended to cover the operations of firms engaged in the public warehousing of general merchandise and refrigerated goods the following are excluded:
(1) Associations and organizations such as cooperatives operating warehouses or storage services for their own members.
(2) Packing houses or other firms operating storage facilities in connection with their respective businesses.
(3) Small food lockers except where they form part of a general warehouse business.

Although not all firms deriving revenue from the warehousing of general merchandise and from refrigerated storage operations are included in this report, the coverage is considered representative of the industry. Factors accounting for incomplete coverage are:
(1) Firms sometimes do not respond.
(2) Firms sometimes file returns too incomplete to be used.
(3) Firms engaged predominantly in some other industry which cannot provide separate statistics for their warehousing operations are excluded.
(4) Mailing lists are not always comprehensive.

The exclusion of household goods storage operators from this report has resulted in a break in the continuity of the data. As a means of linking the 1960 report with 1959 , the following statistics of 54 firms included in the 1959 "Warehousing" report but now contained in the report "Moving and Storage. Household Goods"' are provided below:

Apart from conceptual changes in the content of this report, other factors combine to cause fluctuations in the data from previous years. These include:
(1) Amalgamations.
(2) Births and deaths in the industry.
(3) Improvements in response due to the intensive follow-up and tracer programme.
The Dominion Bureau of Statistics gratefully acknowledges the continued co-operation of respondents, warehousing associations and other interested parties which has resulted in the steady improvement of the statistical quality of this report.

## Summary

The following highlights of the general merchandise and refrigerated storage industry are presented to provide a concise statistical picture of its size and relative importance.


To obtain a more complete picture of total warehousing facilities available and of the revenue earned by these facilities, reference should be made to Table 5. Besides data for firms included in
the other tables of this report, this table contains: statistics of frms whose revenues are earned prodominantly from motor carrier and household goods moving and storage operations. Ine statistics of these firms are included in the 1960 "Motor Carriers - Freight" and "Moving and Storage, Household Goods" reports respectively but are excluded from all tables in this report except number five.

Table 6 compares the statistics of 100 firms whose individual returns were included in both this report and the 1959 "Warehousing" report. Such a comparison of the statistics of a fixed number of firms, while useful as a guide, should not be regarded as a perfect means of comparing the progress of this section of the warehousing industry, because firms which have not reported in both years or have entered into or retired from the industry during the year would be excluded from this table.
