## Genera! Merchandise and Refrigerated Goods)

1968

This publication presents the statistics of tirms engaged primarily in the public warehousing of general merchandise and refrigerated goods

In 1960 , firms earning the major portion of their gross a nnual revenues from household goods storage operations were separated from this series and allocated to a new report entitled "Moving and Storage, Household Goods", Catalogue No. 53-221, where they were combined with companies deriving the majority of their revenues from the movement of household goods. Anyone desiring to obtain a complete picture of the warehousing industry, as it pertains to the storage of general merchandise and refrigerated goods and the storage and movement of household goods, must make use of both the "Warehousing" and the "Moving \& Storage, Household Goods" reports. In addition, a limited amount of storage service is provided by firms engaged primarily in motor carrier freight operations; data of their storage revenues and facilities is given in Table 5 of this report.

As this mublication is interded to cover the questions of firms onsazed th the pulis ware-
housing of general merchandise and refrigerated goods, the following are excluded:
(a) Associations and organizations, such as co-operatives, operating warehouses and storage services for their own members only.
(b) Packing houses, grain elevator companies or other firms operating storage facilities in connection with their own businesses; and
(c) Smal] food lockers, except where they form part of a general warehouse business.

Among other factors which account for fluctuations in data and the number of firms reporting are:
(a) Amalgamations,
(b) Births and deaths in the industry,
(c) Expansions and contractions due to business conditions, and
(d) Improvements in response due to the inten-

The table on page 5 shows that the total operating revenues of the 146 reporting firms in 1968 increased by 4.7 per cent from the total operating revenues of the 143 firms in 1967. However, total operating expenses also rose by 6.9 per cent, causing the net operating revenue to drop by 20.5 per cent. The operating ratio (the ratio of operating expenses to operating revenues) changed from 92.0 in 1967 to 93.9 in 1968.

Table 6 on page 10 , which presents a more precise picture of developments in the industry since it compares the statistics of 118 firms reporting for both years, indicates that, the operating revenues rose by 5.5 per cent, the operating expenses increased by 8.0 per cent producing a
less favourable operating situation, in which the operating ratio changed from 92 . 2 ec cou: bit 1207 to 94.1 per cent in the current year.

Between 1967 and 1968 these sume 1 id firms (80.8 per cent of firms reporting). which earned 90.1 per cent of the total reported revenues and operated 87.2 per cent of the property and equipment, increased their investments in land, buildings and equipment by 10.4 per cent. Their available storage facilities increased by 8.7 per cent.

Based on the depreciated value of their property, the net operating revenue per investment dollar of these firms decreased slightly from 8.5 cents in 1967 to 6.3 cents in 1968.
