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## Introclvetice

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada hive- been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two reguiar monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Eranch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This new series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparisom of the trends in ronthly sales in the tro stages of food distribution. This report is the second of the series, the first issue being thet for October, 1939.

## Tholesile Trede

## Sales

Sales of 44 wholesale treaing houses in the grocery trade averaged 3 per cent higher in November of this year then last but receded 14 per cent below October, unadjusted indexes on the base 1930=100 standing at 109.5 for November, 1939, 126.7 for October, 1939 and 106.2 for November, 1939. The 3 per cent increase over November a year ago is exidence of an almost complete return to normal bujing on the oart of the rotail grocery trade and is in contrest to mergins of 18 and 43 per cent Whicin characterized comparisons of October and September sales with those of corresponding months of 1938.

Fesults for November varied for difierent regions of the country, the 3 per cent increase for the Dominion as a whole being the net resultant of decreases in Ontario and Quebec and increases in all other sections. Sales in the Maritimes were up by 7 per cont; the Prairie Provinces 8 per cent, and British Columbia 11 per cent. Deciines of 1 per cent and 3 per cent belon Novembor 1938 mere recorded for Quebec and Ontario respectively.

## Stocks

Wholesalors' inventorics werc valued 30 per cent higher at the end of November of this year than last and mare up b, 5 per cent from October 31, 1939. Stocks on hand at any period ane unduly hich or ar orly when considcred in relation to sales in the immediately ensuing perior. Stocks on hand at the beginning of November normally amount to approximately 140 per cent of November seles. The corresponding retio for Noveraber, $193 G$ ves 164 per cent indicating that stocks on hand at the beginning of the month were considerably in uxcess of the normal inventory position for that time of year.

Chain Stores
Sales of 1,277 chain store units operated by 30 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 21 per cent highor in November, 1939, than the sales of 1,490 units operated by the same 30 firms in the cor esponding month of 1938. Increases mere greater in the Fiest than in the East. Chain sales in the province of Quebec were up 13 per cent; Ontatio 17 per cent; Prairie Provinces 40 per cent and British Columbia 41 per cent.

Results on an avaerage daily sales basis differ but little from those besed on calendar month totals. Average daily sales for grocery and meat chains were 22 per cent higher in November, 1939 then in November 1938.

## Indenendent Stores

Dollar sales for 1072 independent grocery and combination stores mere 1 per cent higher in November 1939 then in 1938. The Maritime Provinces reported an increase of 6 per cent; Saskatchewan sales were up by 4 per cent; British Colunbia reported a decline of 4 per cent while results for other regions showed but litile change.
