## CURRKNT TRENDS IN FDOD DISTRIBUTION

This bulletin brings together the information on retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetable sales contained in other monthly bulletins on the retail and wholesale trade, thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## WHOLESALE TRADE

## Wholesale Grocers' Sales.

Sales of wholesale grocers in June, 1948 were $14 \%$ higher in dollar volume than in June, 1947 and the same percentage higher than in May, 1948, according to statements submitted by 72 of the larger firms across Canada. Cumulative sales for the first six months of 1948 showed an increase in volume of $7 \%$ over the first half of 1947。 All regions reported increased sales volumes, with gains over June, 1947 ranging from $5 \%$ in quebec to $25 \%$ in the Maritine Provinces.

Fruit and Vegetable Wholesalers' Sales.
Dollar volune of sales of fruit and vegetable dealers con tinued well below last year's level in June when the 48 firms submitting reports registered a decline of $19 \%$. Compared with May, 1948, June sales were up $5 \%$, while the cumulative total for the year to date was $16 \%$ lower than that for the first six months of 1947 . Fruit and vegetable dealers in the Naritine Provinces reported sales $30 \%$ below last June; in British Colunbia there was a drop of $25 \%$; while a decline of $8 \%$ was registered in Cntario.

Grocers ${ }^{9}$ Inventories.
Inventories of wholesale grocers at June 30 , 1948 were $7 \%$ lower in value than at the same date a year ago and $4 \%$ below the end of May this year. Inventories at the beginning of June are normally 20,6 in excess of sales in that month (bascd on the average of 1935-1942), while at the beginning of June this year, they were $14 \%$ below the sales volune for that month.

Chain Stores - June, 1948 sales of 953 chain store units operated by 24 chain companies in the food retailing field were $34 \%$ higher than sales of 960 stores operated by the same 24 firms in June, 1947. Average sales per store in June, 1948 were $\$ 30,694$, $35 \%$ above the $\$ 22,681$ average for the same month of the previous year.

Ontario and quebec had the largest increases ( $36, \%$ and $35 \%$ ), but gains elsewhere were also of sizeable proportions.

Independent Stores - Independent stores did 13; more business in June this year than last. The largest increase of $17 \%$ was recorded in Ontario, followed by gains ranging from $4 \%$ to $15 \%$ in the other regions.
