This bulletin brimes together tie information on retail erocery and wholesale erocery and fruit and vegetable sules contained in other monthly bulletins on the retail and wholesale trade, thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly aules in the two stages of food distribution.

## NHOLESALE TRAJE

## Wholesale Grocers' jales

Dollar volune of sales of wholesule frocers ir July, 1948 was $11 \%$ hither than in July last year and $8 \%$ above June, 1348, according to statemerits subritted by $? 1$ of the larger firms across Canada. Sales for the first seven months of 1948 were $7 \%$ in excess of the dollar volume for the corresponding period of 1947. A decrease of 7, in dollar sules compared with July a year aco was recorded by grocers in aucbec, while those in Ontario and the laritime Provinces had gains of 7,6 and $8, \%$, and in British Colunbia and the Prairie Frovinces, of 19,0 and 21,0 respectively.

Fruit and Vecetable Wholesalers' Sales
Sales of fruit and vegetable dealers in July, 1948 were $23 \%$ lower in dollar volume than in July, 1947 and were 1,6 below the volume in June this your according to statements of 46 of the lareer dealers across the country. Cumulative sales for the year to date were 17 low lor than for the first scven months of 1947. Hritish Columbia sules were down 27,p; the Naritimes and quevec combined, 22,\%; and ontario, 17.

## Grocers' Inventories

Stocks in the hands of wholesale grocer's at the end of July this year were 3,6 hifher in value than those held at the same date a year abo, and 9,0 above tice value of stocks on hand at the end of June this year. Inventories at the beginning of July are normally $7 \%$ in excess of sales in that month - based on the average of 1935-1942 - while stocks on hand at the beginning of July this year were valued 20 , lower than the salas volune for July.

## RETPALL TRADE

Chain Stores - July, 1948 sales of 950 chain store units operated by 24 chain companies in the food retailine field were $40 \%$ higher than sules of 956 stores operated by the same 24 firms in July, 1347. Average sales per store were $\$ 32,688$ in July, 1948 and $\$ 23,344$ in the same month of the previous year.

Increases exceeded 32, in all parts of the country, the largest egains ( $43 \%$ ) occurring in Ontario and British Columbia.

Indenendent Stores - Sales of independent food stores were $13 \%$ hieher in July this year than in July, 1947. Increases were fairly uniform from the Maritimes to Saskatchewan, ranging from 12, to $17 \%$. In Alberta and British Columbia the margin of gain was reduced to $9 \%$ and $8, \%$.
