

CURMND TFPMNOS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, MAY, 1941

## Introduction

Indexes reflectirg curreris trends in food distribution in Canada have been publiahed for somo yeara, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading eotablishments forming components of the two regulac monthly bulletins on retail and wholenale trade isaued by the Intermal trade Branch of the Dominion Bureav of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus focilitating a comparison of the trende in monthly sales in the two stages of food dietribution.

Wnolegele Thade

Sales of 75 of the larger wholosale grocery firms in Canada averaged 3 per cent higher in May of this year than Lact and wore 4 per cent above the April level. The 3 per cent increase over May, 1940 is considerably smaller than those rocorded for earlier months, a result which may be atiributed to the high level of wholesale grocery traing in May last year when considerabie inventory buying by the retail trade took place foliowing the renewal of hocivities on the wentern front. Sales for the year to date stand 11 per cent above the first five months of 1940 .

Wholesale grocers in British Columbia reported a gain of 9 per cent in sales over May last year; Ontarlo sales were up 6 per cent and the Maritime Provinces, 4 per cent. Sales in the Prairie Provinces were practically unchanged while Quebec sales were down by 6 per cent.

## Stocks

Inventorios carried by the wholesale grocery trade were down 1 per cent at the end of May from the corresponding date of 1940 and were 4 per cent lower than inventories at the end of April, 1941. Stocks on hand at any period must be considered in relation to sales in the inmediately following period, Stocks on hand at the beginning of May normally amount to approximately 125 per cent of the May turnover. Stocks on hand at the end of formed 131 per cent of the May sales, indicating that stocks on hand at the beginning of the month were alightly higher than the normal inventory position for that time of year.

Solos of 1,062 chain store units operated by 25 chain companies in the food retailing fieid averaged 24 per cont highse in May, 1941 than sales of 1 s 155 units operated by the same 25 fimis in May a yoar agc. Avorage sales per store were $\$ 12,074$ in My of this yoar, 35 per cent grenter than the $\$ 8,975$ averago in the samo month of 1940. A considerable reauction in tho numbr of storos operated by the reporting chain companies is responsible, to somo extint, fou ths increased sales volume por store.

Incroasos in varion rogicas of tho country were as follows: 29 per cent in Ontario; 21 per cont in Brition Columbia; 17 por cont in Queboc; and 12 per cent in the Prairle Propincea. Arenage daily sales for food chains increased 22 per cent in Mey thia year oror last.

## Indupendent Stores

Dollar sales of 999 independont grocery and combination storea weise 15 por cent higher in May, 1941 than in Kay, 1940, Results on a geographical basis indicate sales increases in every section of the country ranging from a substantial gain of 18 per cent in the Maritimos to one of 8 per cent in Alverta. Ontario and Quebec were nearly the same with increases of 17 and 16 per cent respectively while Saskatchewan sales were up 13 per cent. British Columbia repcrted a gain of 11 per cent and Manitoba one of 10 por cent over May, 1940.
