## CURRENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, JUNE, 1941

Introduction

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution
In Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Sales of 74 of the larger wholesale grocery firms in Canada averaged 9 per cent higher in June of this year than last but were 4 per cent below the May level. The 9 per cent increase over June, 1940 is higher than the increase recorded in the May comparison but is consider ably smaller than the percentage gains recorded in furl and March when gains of 23 per cent and 20 per cent respectively were registered over the corresponding months of 1940. Sales for the first six months of 1941 stand 11 per cent above the level for the first four months of 1940.

Results by economic divisions indicate that sales showed larger gains in the extreme East and West than in other regions. Wholesale grocers in British Columbia reported a gain of 17 per cent in sales over June last year. Sales in the Maritimes were up 12 per cent; the Prairies and Quebec up 9 per cent, while sales in Ontario were up only 5 per cent over June of last year.


## Stocks

Inventories carried by the wholesale grocery trade were down 6 per cent at the end of June from the corresponding date of 1940 and were 6 per cent lower than inventories at the end of 1 ay, 1941. Stocks on hand at any period must be considered in relation to sales in the immediately following period. Stocks on hand at the beginning of June normally enount to approximately 118 per cent of the June turnover. Stocks on hand at the end of Nay formed 132 per cent of the June sales, indicating that stocks on hand at the beginning of the month were substantially hisher than the normal inventory position for that time of year.

Sales of 1,014 chain store units operated by 25 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 8 per cent higher in June, 1941 than sales of 1,104 units operated by the same 25 firms in June a year ago. Average sales por store were 411,187 in June of this year, 18 per cent greater than the 89,508 average in the same month of 1940. A considerable reduction in the number of stores operated by the reporting chain companies is responsible, to some extent, for the increasod sales volume per store.

Increases in various regions of the country were as follows: 10 per cent in Ontario and in British Columbia; $\delta$ per cont in quebec and 2 per cent in the Prairie Provinces. Average daily sales for food chains increased 16 per cent in June of this year over last.

## Indepondent Stores

Dollar sales of 956 indopondent grocery and corabination stores were 4 per cent higher in June, 1941 than in June, 1940. Quebec and the liaritime Provinces showed a gain of 7 per cent, while Ontario and hanitobe reported smaller incresses of 4 and 3 per cent respectively. Saskatchewan and Alberta romained practically unchanged and British Columbia sales were 2 per cent lowor than in June, 1940.
