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## CUREENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, JANUARY, 1942

## Introduction

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada have been published for sone years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Sales of 71 of the larger wholesale houses in Canada averaged 19 per cent higher in January, 1942 than in the corresponding month of 1941 and were 2 per cent higher tmain December, 1941. Substantial gains over January, 1941 were reported in all sactior. of the country. Fer cent increases for the various economic divisions standing as follows: Maritime Provinces, 20 per cent, Quebec, 15 per cent, ontario, 21 per cent, Prairie Provinces, 21 per cent and Eritish Columbia, 19 per cent.

Inventories carried by the wholesale grocery trade were valued 11 per cent higher at the end of January, 1942 than on the corresponding date of last year but were 15 per cent lower than the value of stocks reported on December 31, 1941. Stocks on hand at the beginning of January are normally about 63 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month. Stocks on hand at the beginning of January tris year were 56 per cent in excess of the amount of business transacted during tne month indicating that the stock position at the beginning of January, 1941 was slightly below the normal business for this period of the year.

## Retail Trade

## Caain Stores

Sales of 959 chain store units operated by 25 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 36 per cent higher in Jenuary, 1942 , than sales of 1.035 units operated by the sane 25 firms in January a year ago. Average sales per store were $\$ 15,374$ in January, 1942,45 per cent greater than the $\$ 10,496$ average in the same month of 1941 .

Increases in various regions of the country were as follows: 39 per cent in Quebec, 38 per cent in the Prairie Provinces, 35 per cent in British Columbia, and 34 per cent in Ontario. Average daily sales for food chains increased 28 per cent in January of 1942 over 1941.

## Independent Stores

3 3.les of 981 independent grocery or grocery and mat stores averaged 22 per cont higher in Januery, 1942 than in January, 1941. fll provinces roported increases rancing from 15 per cent in Saslatchowan to 24 per cent in the liaritime Provinces. Incroases for other provinces wore 23 per cont for quebec, 22 per cent for Alberta, 22 per cont in Onterio, 20 per cent in Lanitoba and 17 per cent in British Columbia.
