CURRENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, LPRRIL, 1942

## Introduction

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Camada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Sales of 76 of the larger wholesale houses in Canada averaged 2 per cent higher in April of this year than last but declined by 4 per cont from iarch. Sales for the first four months of the current yoar stand 14 per cent over the corresponding period a yoar ago. The 2 per cent increase is considerably smaller than the gains recorded for the first three months of the year. The Laritime Provinces showed an increase of 6 per cent over April a yoar ago, while smaller gains were reported for other regions as follows: Quebec, 3 per cont; Prairio Provinces and British Columbia oach 2 por cent The volume of business transactod by grocery wholesalors in Ontario romained unchanged from the corrosponding month last year.

Inventories carriad by the wholesalo grocory trade wore valued 9 per cent higher at the ond of April, 1942, than on the corrosponding date of last yoar and were 2 per cont higher than the value of stocks reported on March 31, 1942. Stocks on hand at the beginning of April are normally 33 per cont in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month. Stocks on hand at tho beginning of April this yoar woro 44 per cent in excess of the amount of businoss transacted during the month indicating thet the stock position at the beginning of April, 1942, was ebove the normal position for this poriod of the year.

## Retail Trade

## Chain Stores

Sales of 983 chain store units operated by 25 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 22 per cent higher in April, 1942, than sales of 1,037 units operated by the same 25 firms in April a year ago. Average sales por store were $\$ 14,212$ in April, 1942, 28 per cent greater than the 311,090 average for the same month of 1941.

Increases in various regions of the country were as follows: 29 per cent in Quebac, 20 per cent in Ontario, 23 per cent in the Prairie Provinces, and 16 per cent in British Columbia.

## Indepandent Stores

Sales of 990 independent grocery or grocery and meat stores averaged 16 per cent highor in april of this year than last, all sections of the country contributirg to the increase. Increases for the provinces ranged from 21 per cent for quebec, 16 per cent for the Maritime Provinces, 15 per cent in Ontario, 13 per cent in lianitoba, 12 per cont in Alborta, 10 per cont in British Columbia, and 5 por cont in Saskatchewan.
