CURRTAIT TRTHDS II: FOOD DISTRIBUTIOn F FEBRUARY 1343
Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada love been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistic. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of tho trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

Wholesale Trade
The dollar value of soles transacted by 71 of the larger wholesale grocery establishments increased 3 per cent in February of this year over February, 1942, and recorded a 4 per cent gain over the veluo of merchandise sold in January. Gains registered in Ontario and the pastern Provinces were offset by the decline in sales reported in the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia. Reports received from grocery wholesalers in Quebec revealed a 10 per cent increase; sales in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces were up 8 per cent; while the Prairie Provinces and British Columbin recorded decreases of 2 ind 5 per cent respectively,

Stocks on hand on Feluruary 28, 1943, declined by 14 per cent from the inventory position on the corresponding date of last year, and were valued 3 per cent lower then the stocks held at the end of January, 1343. Stocks at the beginning of February are normally 67 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month. Stocks at the beginning of February, 1943, were 43 per cent in excess of the volume of business realized in the month, indicating that the stock position at the beginning of February was below the normal situation for this time of the year.

## Retail Trade <br> Chain Stores

Sales of 929 chain store units operated by 27 chain companies in the food retailing field avoraged 12 per cont lower in Febmary, 1243 , than sales of 365 units operated by the same 27 rims in February a yoar ago. Average sales per store were \$11,730 in February, 1943, 8 per cent lower than the \$12,757 average for the same month of 1942.

Salez decreased by 14 per cent in Quebec, 15 per cent in Ontario, and 6 per cent in Britich Columbia, wilo an increase of 2 per cent occurred in the Prairie Provinces

## Independent Stores

Sales of 910 independent grocery or grocery and meat stores avernged 14 per cent higher in February, 1943, than in Februncy, 1942. Increases in the dollar volume of business transacted were reported by all regions of the country. Gains recorded over February of last yeur vere as follows: Maritimes, 10 per cent; Quebec, 18 per cent; Ontario, 13 per cent; hanitoba, 8 per cont; Sacketchewan, 7 per cent; Alherta, 12 per cent; British Columbia, 18 per cent.
