## CURRENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, APRIL, 1943

Indexes reflecting current treads in food distribution in Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery trading establishments forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## WHolesale Trade

Statements received from 72 of the larger wholesale grocery houses in Canada showed a 6 per cent increase in sales in April, 1943 compared with the dollar volume of business transacted in April, 1942, but sales declined by 7 per cent from the March level of trading. Gains reported in the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario were offset by the declines in dollar sales in the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia. Sales increased by 14 per cent in the Maritimes, 16 per cent in quebec. 14 per cent in Ontario while decreases of 5 and 14 per cent were registered for the Prairies and British Columbia respectively. Cumulative indexes for the first four months of this year stand 4 per cent higher than for the corresponding period of last year.

Stocks in the hands of grocers on April 30, 1943, were value 14 per cent lower than inventories held at the end of April last year, and were practically unchanged from the value of merchandise reported on hand at the end of March. Stocks at the beginning of April are normally 33 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in the ensuing month. Stocks at the beginning of April, 1943, were 19 per cent in excess of the volume of business realized in the month, indicating that the stock position at the beginning of April had fallen considerably below the normal situation for this time of the year.

## Retall Trade

## Chain Stores

Sales of 893 chain store units operated by 26 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 4 per cent lower in April, 1943, than sales of 923 units operated by the same 2.6 firms in April a year ago. Average sales per store were $\$ 14,779$ in April, 1943, I per cent lower than the $\$ 14,941$ average for the same month of 1942.

Sales decreased by 2 per cent in Quebec, 7 per cent in Ontario, and were unchanged in British Columbia, while an increase of 4 per cent occurred in the Prairie Provinces.

## Independent Stores

Sales of 894 independent grocery or grocery and meat stores increased in dollar volume by 17 per cent in April, 1943 over the value of business transactad in the same month of last year. The increase was shared by all regions of the country, the following gains being recorded over April, 1942: Maritimes, 16 per cent; Quebec, 17 per cent; Ontari 0, 27 per cent; Manltoba, 12 per cent; Saskatchewan, 18 per cent; Alberta, 16 per cent; British Columbia, 17 per cent.
