## CURReNT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, SEPTEMBER, 1943

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery sales forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Internal Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

The dollar volume of sales transacted by 72 of the larger grocery wholesale establishments increased by 2 per cent in Sept ember of this year over September, 1942. Cumulative figures for the first nine mont hs of the current year stand 3 per cent higher than for the corresponding period last year. Quebec and ontario reported a decline in sales of 8 per cent and 1 per cent respectively, while gains reported for the other regions were as follows: Maritimes, 14 per cent; Prairies, 3 per cent; British Columbia, 7 per cent.

Inventories held by grocery wholesalers were valued 2 per cent lower at the end of September, 1943, than on the correspond ing date of last year, but increased by 5 per cent over the value of stocks reported on hand on August 31, 1943. Stocks on hand at the beginning of September are normally 5 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month. Inventories on hand at the beginning of Sept ember this year were 6 per cent in excess of September sales, indicating that the stock position at the beginning of September, 1943, was slightly above the normal position for that period of the year.

## Retail Sales

## Chain Stores

Sales of 868 chain store units operated by 22 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 2 per cent lower in September, 1943 , than sales of 892 units operated by the same 22 fims in September a year ago. Average sales per store were $\$ 13,904$ in september, 1943 , almost unchanged fram the $\$ 13,834$ average for the same month of 194.2.

Sales decreased by 5 per cent in quebec, 2 per cent in ontario, and 5 per cent in British Columbia, while the Prairie Provinces showed an increase of 4 per cent over September last year.

Comparison of Stores and Sales for Sentember, 1942 and 1943


Sales of 889 independent grocery or grocery and meat stores increased in dollar volume by 8 per cent in September, 1943, over the value of business transacted in the same mont $h$ of last year. The increase was shared by all regions of the country except British Columbia, the following gains being recorded over September, 1942: Maritimes, 4 per cent; quebec, 8 per cent; Ontario, 9 per cent; Manitoba, 8 per cent; Saskatchewan, 13 per cent and Alberta, 8 per cent. Sales wer practically unchanged in British Columbia.
