

CURTENT TRIND IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, OCTOBER, 1944

Indexes reflectine current trends in food distribution in Canada have been publishod for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale crocery sales formine components of the two regulur monthly bulletins on retail and wholesule trade issued by the Werciandising and Services Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retuil and wholesale procery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Reports received from 77 of the lurger wholouale grocery ostablishments in Canada revealed that Octobor sales were 20 ner cent inifner than the volune of business trunsacted in October, 1943 , but were 3 per cent below dollar sales rualizoo in September of this year. The increase of 20 per cent over october, 1343 reflects a rayid turnover of merciandise in all refions 0 : the country, sules acvancine fron 15 per cent in British Colunbia to 23 jor cent in quebec. Increases of 5 and 9 per cent over tie september leve? of traing recorded in the Naritime Frovinces und que wec, respectively, were onfset by declines of I per cont in ontario, 10 per cont in the Prairies, and 10 per eent in British Columbia, to register in total an overull deeline of 3 per cent. Cumalative sules for tie first ten months of this year increased 13 per cent ovor the same perio: of 1943.

Inventories reported on hamd iat tise end of october, 1344 , were vulued $?$ per cent ilicher than the stocks held at thc close of october last year, and were 12 per cent greater than the stock holiines reportod at the end of soptember, 1944. Inventories at the boginnine of october are rormally in per cent in excess of the volume of business transucted durine that month. stocks ut the beginninc of octobor this year were 3 per cent below the sales transacted during tile montr inuicutink thet tiee inventory position at the beginnine of October was considerably below the normal level for that perio? of the year.

$\underline{\text { Retail Sales }}$
Chain Stores
Sales of 907 chain store units operated by $2 C$ chain companies in the food retalling field averaged 7 per cont iifenei in Dctober, 1944, than sales of 919 units operatod by the same 26 firms in October a year ago. Average sales per store were $\$ 15,611$ in October, $194 \pm$, 8 per cent hisher than the 14,428 average for the same month of 1943.

Sales increased by 16 per cent in quebec, 6 per cent in ontario, 1 per cent in the Prairie Provinces and 2 per cent in British Columbia.

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Independent Stores
Sales in most regions of the country mintuined or sliphtly exceeded the Volune for october, 1943. Declines of 2 and 3 ner cent in quebec and Ontario, however, were sufficient to offset the increases occurrinf, elsewhere. Independent food stores in British Columbia did 5 per cent more business in October this year than last. Gains of 2 per cent in the Maritime provinces and in Manitoba were accompanied by a 1 per cent increase in Alberta while sulcs in Saskatchewan were unchanged from october a year ago.
