CURRENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, APRIL, 1944

Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesale grocery sales forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Merchandising and Services Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

Wholesale Trade

Statements received from 74 of the larger wholesale grocery houses in Conada indicated that sales transacted during April were 6 per cent greater than the dellar sales realized in April, 1943, but were 11 per cent lower than March sales. Quebec reported a 4 per cent decline which was effect by increases of 6 per cent in the Maritime Provinces, 6 per cent in Ontario, 9 per cent in British Columbia and 11 per cent in the Prairie Provinces. The decline from the March level of trading was felt in all regions of the country, decreases ranging from 9 per cent in Quebec to 15 per cent in the Maritimes. Cumulative sales for the first four months of the year have increased 9 per cent over the same period of last year.

Wholesale grocers valued their stocks on hand at the end of April, 1944, 15 per cent higher than the inventories held at the end of April last year, but the inventory position declined by 2 per cent from the stock holdings reported at the end of March. Stocks at the beginning of April are normally 35 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month. Stocks at the beginning of April this year exceeded sales transacted during the month by 34 per cent, indicating that the inventory position at the beginning of April was on a par with the normal level for that period of the year.

Retail Sales

Chain Stores

Sales of 949 chain store units operated by 27 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 8 per cent higher in April, 1944, than sales of 962 units operated by the same 27 firms in April a year ago. Average sales per store were \$15,408 in April, 1944, 10 per cent higher than the \$14,015 average for the same month of 1943.

Sales increased by 7 per cent in Quebec, 11 per cent in Ontaric, 5 per cent in the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia respectively.

Independent Stores

Sales of 859 independent grocery or grocery and meat stores increased in dollar volume by 4 per cent in April, 1944, over the value of business transacted in the same month of last year. The following gains were recorded over April, 1943: Maritimes, 9 per cent; Quebec, 5 per cent; Ontario, 1 per cent; Manitola, 9 per cent; Saskatchewan, 3 per cent; Alberta, 11 per cent while British Golumbia, decreased fractionally over the same month last year.
