## CURPIMT TRUNDS II FOOD DISTRIBUTICN, SEPTRNBER, 1944

Indexes reflocting current trends in food distribution in Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail and wholesule grocery sales forming components of the two reeular monthly bulletins on retial and wholesale trade issued by the Nerchandising and Services Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brinfs together in one report the information on retail and wholesale grocery sales cont?ined in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale grocery sales transactod by 76 of the lareer wholesale erocery establishments in Uanada durine September, 1344, increased 12 per cent over the dollar volume of business reported in jeptember, 1943, and 2 per cent over hugust, 1944. All rogions of the country shared in the 12 por cent gain, increases registered by the various economic divisions beine as follows: Maritime Frovinces, 14 per cent; Nuebec, lö per cent; Onturio, 9 per cent; Frairie Frovinces, 11 per cent, and British Columbia, 13 per cent. ABErceiate fifures for the Jonuary-September period of 1944 stand 12 per cent above sales for the sane period of 1343.

Inventories in the hands of wholesale erocers were valued 9 per cent higher at the end of jeptember this year than last, and were 3 per cent ereater than the stocks held at the end of August, 1944. Stocks at the beginning of September are normally 10 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted during that month. stccks at the beginning of September this year were 8 per cent below sales transacted during the month, indicating that the inventory position at the beginning of septenber was considerably below the normal level for that period of the year.

## Retail Sales

Chain Stores
Sales of 913 chain store units operated by 25 chain companies in the food retailine field averaeed 24 per cent higher in september, 1944 , thar sules of 931 units operated by the same 25 firms in 3eptember a year aco. dverace sales per store were ${ }^{\circ} \mathrm{k}, 737$ in September, 1944, 20 per cent higher than the $\$ 15,354$ average for the same month of 1943.

Sales increased by 35 per cent in quebec, 24 per cent in ontario, 16 per cent in the Prairic Frovinces and 13 per cent in British Columbia.

## Independent Stores

Sales of 957 frocery or combination erocery and meat stores recorded an increase of 10 per cent in dollar volume in Septomber, 1944 over the value of business trunsacted in the same month a year ago. Gains of 16 per cent in the Naritime Provinces and 13 per cent in lanitoba were tho hifhest recorded for any recion. Gains elsewhere were fairly uniform and amounted to 11 per cent in Saskatchowan, 10 per cent in Quebec, 9 per cont in both Alberta and British Columbia and 8 per cent in ontario.
