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CURRENT TRENDS TN FOOD DISTRIBUTION, TA!UARY, 1945
Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada have been published for some years, indexes of retail procery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetables sales forming components of the two regular monthly bulletins on retail and wholesale trade issued by the Merchandising and Services Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the informatin on retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetables sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## Wholesale Trade

Wamary sales transacted by food wholesalers increased 22 per cont in the grocery trade and 8 per cent in the fruit and vegetables trade over January, 1944, according, to statements received from 75 grocery wholesalers and 41 fruit and vergetable wholesale merchants. Grocery sales were 2 per cent greater than the December business but the Jamary fruit and vegetable trading fell 20 per cent below the Decomber level.

The 22 per cent and 8 per cont gains were shared by all regions of the country. Results for the grocery trade on a regional basis are as follows: Maritime Provinces, 17 per cent; Quebec, 20 per cent; Ontario, 28 per cent; Prairie Provinces, 17 per cent; British Columbia, 23 per cent. Fruit and vegetable sales increased 4 per cent in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, 6 per cent in Ontario, and 13 per cent in the Western Provinces.

The percentage increases quoted above relate to the total business of firms classified either as grocery or as fruit and vegetable wholesalers. Firms dealing chiefly in grocery products and considered as wholesale grocers may carry some fruits and vegetables. Conversely, although to a smaller degree, fruit and vegetable wholesalers may carry some dry groceries. As just stated, the percentage changes quoted above relate to the business of each of the two trades in their entirety not to the sales of grocery products alone or to the sale of fruit and vegetables alone.

Inventories in the hands of wholesale grocers at the end of January this year were valued 2 per cent lower than the stocks held on January 31, 1944, and 5 per cent lower than the stocks reported on hand at the end of December, 1944. Stocks at the beginning of January are normally 63 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted in that month as reflected in the average experience over the years 1935 to 1942. Stocks at the beginning of January, 1945 , were 34 per cent in excess of the volume of business transacted, indicating that the inventory position
at the beginning of the year had dropped considerable below the normal position for that period of the year.

## Retail Sales <br>  <br> Chain Stores

Sales of 906 chain store units oporated by 28 chain companies in the food retailing field averaged 13 per cent higher in January, 1945, than sales of 894 units operated by the same 28 firms in January a year afo. Average salos per store were $\$ 16,037$ in January, 1945 , 14 per cent higher than the $\$ 14,048$ average for the same month of 1944.

Sales increased by 8 per cent in the Maritime provinces, 17 per cont in Quebec, 11 per cent in Ontario, 13 per cent in the Prairic Provinces and 16 per cont in British Colunhia.

Independent stores

The sample of independent food stores has recently been enlaread to include a representative number of meat stoms. Firures for meat stores are combined with those for grocery stores and comoinatici procery and moat stores in the summary presented below.

Sales of 1,247 independent food stores averaged 5 per cent higher in January this year over last. There was an unusual degree of uniformity in the results for various parts of the country, increases ranping from 1 per cent in Alberta to 7 per cent in British Columbia.
