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CIRRENT TRENDS IH FOOD DISTRIBITION, DECEMRER, 1945
Indexes reflecting current trends in food distribution in Canada havo been published for some years, indoxes of retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruits and vegetables sales forming components of the two repular monthly bulletins on retail. and wholesale trade issued by the Merchandising and Services Rranch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This series brings together in one report the information on retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetable sales contained in the other bulletins thus facilitatinp a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stares of food distribution.

Wholesale Trade
Wholesale grocery sales increasgd 5 per cent in December, 1945 over 1944 , but declined 13 per cent from the November, 1945 volune of trading, according, to statements reccived from 77 of the larger wholesale grocory houses operating in Canada. Results on a regional basis wore not uniform. Gains over December, 1944 were as followss Maritime Provinces, 6 per cent; Quebec, 1 per cent; Ontario, 8 per cent; Prairie Provinces, 2 per cont; and British Columbia, 6 per cent. The dollar grocery business transacted in 1945 exceeded 1944 sales by 6 per cent.

December wholesale fruit and vegetable sales were up 27 per cent over December, 1944 and 6 per cont over November, 1945 . Results are based on returns received from 43 wholesale fruit and vegetable wholesalers in canada. The 27 per cent gain reflects an active market in all regions of the country, sales increasing, 20 per cent in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, 35 per cent in Ontario, and 24 per cent in the Western Provinces. Total sales transacted in 1945 stand 18 per cent above the 1944 volume of wholesale fruit and vegetable ssles.

Grocery stocks in the hands of wholesalcrs at the end of 1945 were voluod 8 per cent below the inventories held on December 31,1944 but increased 8 per cent over the stocks reported on hand at the end of November, 1945. Inventories at the beginning of December are normally 64 per cent in excess of the business transacted during that month. Stocks on hand at the beginning of December, 1945 , were 1 per cent below the volume of December sales, indicating that the inventory position at the befinning of December was docidedly below the normal situation for that period of the year.

Wolesale Fruit and Vegetable Trade by Sconomic Dirisions


December, 1945 sales of 917 chain store units operated by 27 chain companies in the food retailinf, field were 3 per cent higher than sales of 944 stores operated by the same 27 firms in Docember, 1944. Average sales per store in December, 1945 were $\$ 19,949,6$ per cent above the $\$ 18,900$ average for the same month of the previous year.

Increases, closely resembling the average gain occurred in most sections of the country, with the exception of the Prairie Provinces where sales were 1 per cent lower than in December, 1944.

## Indopendent Stores

Independent food retailers reported sales 7 per cent higher in December, 1945 than in December, 1944. In all provinces with the exception of Quobec, the increases were within two percentage points of tho result for canada as a whole. The volume of sales in Quebec stores incressed by only 3 per cent in the Decomber comparison. The largest among the regional increases were 9 per cent gains in Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta.
