This bulletin brings together the information on retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetable sales contained in other monthly bulletins on the retail and wholesale trade thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

WOOL BALE TRADE

## Grocers' Sales

November sales of 74 of the larger grocery wholesalers across Canada ware $23 \%$ higher than in November, 1945 , bringing the cumulative sales for the 11 months of 1947 to a level $18 \%$ in excess of that for the corresponding period of 1946. Compared with October, 1947, dollar volume of grocers' sales showed a drop of $10 \%$.

British Columbia and Ontario continued to record the largest pains over 1946 at $33 \%$ and $27 \%$ respectively. Cumulative sales for 11 months of 1947 for British Columbia and Ontario were $24 \%$ and $19 \%$ higher than in the coresponding period of 1946. Increases recorded for the other regions, with the 11 -month cumulative per cont change in brackets, are as follows: Quebec, $21 \%$ ( $16 \%$ ) ; Prairies, $18 \%(15 \%)$; Maritimes, $17 \%$ ( $14 \%$ ).

Fruit and Vegetable Dealers' Silos
Dollar sales of fruits and vegetables in Canara were $1 \%$ higher than in November a year ago according to statements submitted by 49 of the larger dealers in the country. There was a drop from Cotober of $4 \%$, while cumulaLive sales for the 13 months of 1947 were 5 below those for the corresponding period of 1046.

A substantial pain over November, 1946, of $18 \%$ was recorded by wholesalers in the Laritimes and Quebec combined, Ontario sales were up $2 \%$ while in the ifestern Provinces, sales continued below the 1946 level by $10 \%$.

Grocers: Inventories
Stocks on hand at the end of November, 1947 showed an increase in value of $20 \%$ compared with the same date a year a go and were $11 \%$ higher in value than at the end of October, 1947. Stocks on hand at the beginning of November are normally $43 \%$ in excess of sales in that month. Inventories at the begiming of November this year were valued $7 \%$ below November sales.

Chain Stores - November, 1947 sales of 875 chain store units operated by 28 chain companies in the food retailing field were $43 \%$ higher than sales of 874 stores opereted by the same 28 firms in November, 1946. Average sales per store in November, 1947 were 28,760 , 43 per cent above the $\$ 20,122$ average for the same month of the previous year.

The largest increases in chain food store sales occurred in Ontario and British Columbia. Gains of $47 \%$ in each of these regions surpassed the $43 \%$ advance for the country as a whole. The Maritime Provinces recorded a gain of $40 \%$ Quebec, $37 \%$, and the Prairie Provinces, $32 \%$ over November last year.

In this field also Ontario and Eritish Columtia led with cuins of $8 \%$ and $9 \%$ respectively. All other prov= irces showed uniform incroases rangirn from $2, \%$ to $5 \%$.
