## CURRENT TRENDS IN FOOD DISTRTBITMT TN

## SEPTEMBER, 1947

This bulletin brings together the information on retail grocery and wholesale grocery and fruit and vegetable sales containe in other monthly bulletins on the retail and wholesale trade thus facilitating a comparison of the trends in monthly sales in the two stages of food distribution.

## WHOLESALE TRADE

Grocers' Sales - Sales of wholesale grocers in September 1947 adlanced $23 \%$ from September 1946 and were $11 \%$ above August 1947 ac cording to reports submitted by 74 of the larger wholesalers across Canada. Grocers in British Columbia recorded the largest increase over September a year ago at $30 \%$. Sales in quebec were up 26\% and in the prairie provinces, $25 \%$. Wholesalers in the Maritimes and ontario reported sales $22 \%$ and $17 \%$ respectively, above last year. Cumulative sales for the first 9 months of 1947 were 15\% higher than in the corresponding period of last year.

Fruit and Vegetable Dealers' Sales - Wholesale dealers in fruits and vegetables registered an increase in sales of $1 \%$ over September last year but were 6 below August 1947. These figures are based on statements received from 48 wholesale dealers across Canada. ontario dealers recorded a gain of $9 \%$ over September 1946 while sales in the Maritimes and Quebec combined increased 4\%. A drop of $4 \%$ was registered in the Western Provinces. Cumulative sales for the first 9 months of 1947 were $6 \%$ below the volume in the corresponding period of 1946.

Grocers Stocks - Stocks in the hands of wholesale grocers at the end of September 1947 were valued $22, \%$ higher than at the same date last year and 3 㗫 higher than at August 31 of this year. Inventories at the beginning of September are normally lo\% in excess of sales during that month. Stocks on hand at the beginning of september this year were valued $13 \%$ lower than sales in that month.

## Retail Trade

Chain Stores - September, 1947 sales of 886 chain store units operated by 28 chain companies in the food retailing field were 43 per cent higher than sales of 891 ftwres operated by the same 28 firms in September, 1946. Average sales per store in September, 1947 were 26,140 , 44 per cont above the $\$ 18,136$ average for the same month of the previous year.
quebec and ontario led in chain food store sales with increases of 47 and 46 per cent respectively. Boitish Columbia and the Marltime Provincos each recorded a gain of approximately 38 per cent, while in the prairie Provinces sales advanced 29 per cent. The result for the country as a whole was 43 per cent higher than last yeax.

Independent Stores ". Independent food stores did 12 per cent more business in fentember this year than last. Larger increases orcurred in ontario and the western provinces than in the east. Gains ranging from 11 to 16 per cent were recorded in central and western Cenada, while Quebec registered a smaller adtance of 9 per cent and the Maritime Provinces 7 per cent.
