



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Preface

Information about registered nurses has been collected in Canada for more than twenty years. These data play an important role in planning nursing services, health care delivery, and developing policy. Collecting, editing and analyzing data required to provide a national perspective on nurses and nursing is a major initiative requiring the collaboration of several key stakeholders including the Regulating Authorities for registered nurses (RNs) within each province/territory, the Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI), Statistics Canada and the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA).

The previous Registered Nurses Database (RNDB) publication series, produced by Statistics Canada, was titled, *Revised Registered Nurses Data Series* (1980 to 1988) and *Registered Nurses Management Data* (1989 to 1998). In 1999, CIHI assumed responsibility for producing the annual publication, now titled, *Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada*, and for all data management and dissemination from the RNDB, dating back to 1980.

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Introduction

Since the 1980s, the Registered Nurses Database (RNDB) has been used by the federal and provincial governments, nursing stakeholder groups, and various private organizations and researchers as a data source on the supply and distribution of registered nurses in Canada.

The RNDB is useful for nursing resource planning because it captures data on almost all nurses in Canada, and because the longevity of the data series provides a useful historical perspective of nursing supply and distribution. Ideally, information found in RNDB should be used in conjunction with data on the workload levels of RNs. Despite the existence of such systems for physicians in Canada, there is no comprehensive, national system to monitor RN workload.

The focus of Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, 1999 is to provide summary and detailed tables reflecting the status of RNs in 1999. Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, 1999 offers detailed and summary tables on RN demographics and practice information. In addition, this publication includes:

- a summary descriptive analysis of 1999 RN data;
- selected historical information offering a contextual perspective on 1999 RN supply and distribution;
- easy to understand summary figures and tables;
- education statistics; and
- a special analytical focus section: RN demographic and practice characteristics by age.

Comprehensive historical data are available through special request, on a cost recovery basis. Previous printed publications produced from RNDB, by Statistics Canada from RNDB are no longer available.

Methodological Notes

Background

The Registered Nurses Database (RNDB) contains information on registered nurses in Canada from 1980 to the present and is maintained by the Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI).

Data presented in this annual publication on RNs in Canada include, age and sex, basic and post-basic nursing education, year and province of graduation, post-basic education in other than nursing, employment status, full-time/part-time status, location of employment, location of residence, type of employer, primary area of responsibility and position of employment.

Data Sources and Collection

Data presented in this publication are derived primarily from the RNDB, however supplemental data series such as education data from the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA), Labour Force Survey and Population Data from Statistics Canada, and United States and Canadian Immigration Data are also presented.

RNDB Data

The collection of registered nursing data are governed by a Core Data Agreement. Nursing registrars and stakeholders (CIHI), Statistics Canada, and the CNA meet approximately every three years to consider changes to data elements collected.

The provincial/territorial regulating authorities (PTRAs) are responsible for data collection, which occurs during the annual registration process. The data are electronically captured from the registration forms by the PTRAs, who then send the data files to CIHI.

Once the data files are received by CIHI, all records are processed using established edit checks, and an exception report is produced. This report identifies where the coding values do not match the expected standards or pass specific logical edits. CIHI and the provincial/territorial-nursing registrar who submitted the data review all deviations from the coding standards. The data are either corrected, when possible, or changed to the appropriate default value.

Responsibility for the RNDB was transferred from Statistics Canada to CIHI for the 1996 data year. At this time, CIHI assumed the data collection and processing responsibilities for the Registered Nurses Survey, although the annual publication was still produced by Statistics Canada. The Statistics Canada publication series was titled, Revised Registered Nurses Data Series (1980 to 1988) and Registered Nurses Management Data (1989 to 1998). In 1999, CIHI assumed the additional responsibility of producing the annual publication, now titled Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, and for all data management and dissemination back to 1980. As registration is mandatory, and by definition, a RN must be registered to practice, it is theoretically possible to count all RNs in Canada.

As the registration renewal dates vary across the provinces/territories, a collection methodology was developed to optimize the completeness of coverage and the timeliness of the data.

In the late 1980s, core data agreements required regulating authorities to submit data when they expected to have 95% of the registrations. This requirement evolved into a fixed date. For the years, 1980 to 1993 data were derived from the first four months of each PTRA's registration year. From 1994 to the present year, data are derived from the first six months of each PTRA's registration year.

The result of this collection strategy is that RNDB systematically undercounts the number of RNs in Canada, as data are only obtained for those who register within the first six months. RNs who register after this date are not counted in that particular registration year. This has minimal affect on long-term trends, but may have an adverse effect on short-term trends and inter-provincial comparisons. Counts in RNDB will differ from existing provincial/territorial data sources; however, the difference is less than five percent provincially.

All files are maintained on a network database (SQL) system that is used for producing standard reports, ad-hoc queries and special projects.

Canadian Nurses Association Education Data

Data on the number of people enrolled in nursing education/training programs and the number of graduates from these programs were provided by the CNA. The CNA annually surveys all relevant institutions via questionnaire. RNs have traditionally received their educational qualifications via two pathways: a three-year diploma program at a community college or a four-year Baccalaureate of Science in Nursing (BScN) Program offered through a university. In addition, RNs with diplomas may enter a specialized two-year BScN program to upgrade their education. Post-diploma BScN entrants/graduates are not included in the CNA counts provided because they are already qualified RNs. Since the early 1980's the CNA and eventually all provinces and territories adopted a policy to require a BScN for entry to practice.

Both admission and graduation data have limitations and should be viewed with caution. Inconsistent reporting and lack of follow-up have hampered the accuracy of the admission data. The value of graduate data are limited by non-reporting by institutions and lack of disclosure of these non-reporting institutions makes it impossible to determine the level of underreporting.

Population Data

All population data used in this publication are from the Demography Division, Statistics Canada and their various publications. Population estimates for January 1 of a following year are obtained by CIHI when the figures are released by Statistics Canada at the end of March of the same year (i.e. 1999 population figures actually represent estimates for January 1, 2000). Appropriate revisions to population data are done on an annual basis by CIHI upon publication of the most recent years' RNDB data. All population sources are noted on the tables. See Appendix A for population data used to generate RN/population ratios.

Note to Readers: Statistics Canada information is used with the permission of the Minister of Industry, as Minister responsible for Statistics Canada. Canadian Labour Force Survey (LFS)

The Canadian Labour Force Survey (LFS) is a household survey carried out monthly by Statistics Canada, and is representative of the Canadian non-institutional population 15 years of age and older. The survey coverage excludes residents of long-term care health facilities (more than six months), members of the Canadian armed forces, persons living on Indian Reserves and those in the Northwest Territories and the Yukon. The survey uses a reference week concept to measure labour market activity, and the reference week is typically the week containing the fifteenth day of the month. More information on the LFS can be found at http://www.statcan.ca/english/IPS/Data/71-543-GIE.htm The LFS data in this publication is an annual average of 12 months of data.

Canadian Immigration Data

Counts of RNs who have entered Canada as landed immigrants are obtained from Citizenship and Immigration Canada. Landed immigrants can enter with prearranged employment (which means employment has been prearranged for them through Citizenship and Immigration) or without prearranged employment. RNs entering without prearranged employment by Citizenship and Immigration may or may not have employment opportunities already established.

U.S.A. Immigration Data

The number of RNs whose last country of permanent residence was Canada, and who have been granted permanent residence status in the U.S.A. are supplied by the U.S.A. Immigration Service. The year the RN obtained permanent residence status is not necessarily the same year in which the RN moved to the U.S.A. The RN may have been in the U.S.A. for numerous years before they requested, and were granted, permanent resident status.

Data Quality

In 1999, CIHI developed a data quality framework that will be implemented with all databases at CIHI. The new framework was piloted with 1996 to 1999 data from the RNDB. A summary of the key findings is included in the methodological notes of this publication. For the detailed report on the status of the data quality of the RNDB, including the edit routines and response rates, please contact the Senior Analyst, RNDB.

File Submission

From 1980 to 1995, PTRAs submitted raw data along with file layouts to Statistics Canada who then mapped provincial/territorial values to the national standard. In 1996, each PTRA has required to submit their data according to the CIHI *Registered Nurses System Data Dictionary and Data Submission Specifications*. A copy of available 1999 registration forms can be found in Appendix B. For provincial/territorial regulatory requirements please contact the jurisdiction of interest. Contact information is available in Appendix C.

Validation and Processing of the Provincial Nursing Files

Once the data file is received by CIHI, all records are processed using established edit checks and an exception report is produced. This report identifies where the coding values do not match the expected standards (i.e. codes that fail to meet the file submission specifications outlined in the *Registered Nurses System Data Dictionary and Data Submission Specifications*), or pass logical edits. An example of a logical edit would be a check to ensure the year of birth of a RN is not greater than their year of graduation. All deviations from the coding standards are reviewed by CIHI and the provincial/territorial nursing registrar who submitted the data. The data are either corrected, when possible, or changed to the appropriate default value. It is possible for a registered nurse to be registered in more than one province or territory. In order to improve the accuracy of the counts, CIHI also edits the data to ensure each RN is represented only once in the database.

Flagging and Removal of Interprovincial Duplicates

Information collected in the Survey of RNs is obtained through the registration process in each of the ten provinces, the Yukon and the Northwest Territories. Because RNs can register in more than one province/territory, it becomes necessary to remove these interprovincial duplicates to provide a more accurate picture of the actual number of nurses registered in Canada.

In order to solve the problem of duplicate registrations, it was decided to restrict the information collection period to the first six months of each province's registration year. Although such a process does not cause significant loss of registrations, as most registrations do occur in the initial months of the year, it does reduce the number of duplicate registrations arising from the height of interprovincial migration occurring during the summer.

Nevertheless, duplicate registrations resulting from RNs habitually maintaining registration in more than one province/territory do remain. The bulk of these were removed by accepting as main records only those registrations which met the following conditions:

- (1) for RNs employed in nursing, accept the record whose Province of Employment was identical to its Province of Registration; if Province of Employment was not stated, accept the record whose Province of Residence was identical to its Province of Registration; or
- (2) for RNs not employed in nursing, or whose Activity Status was not stated on the registration form, accept the record whose Province of Residence was identical to its Province of Registration; if Province of Residence was not stated, accept the record whose Province of Employment, if known, was identical to its Province of Registration.

Such a method for eliminating interprovincial duplicates does introduce certain errors.

- (1) A RN lives and registers in one province at the beginning of the year and, one to three months later, moves to and registers in another province; this obvious duplicate will not be detected.
- (2) A RN, not working in nursing, is registered in a province other than his/her province of residence; this registration will be identified erroneously as a duplicate.
- (3) A RN working for the Department of National Defence or for Health Canada is employed in a province other than his/her province of registration; this registration will be erroneously flagged as a duplicate. These two federal departments only require that their nursing employees be currently registered in Canada, although not necessarily in their province of employment.

The methodology for removal of interprovincial duplicates has remained relatively consistent over the years. However, methodological enhancements were undertaken in 1996 in order to gain more information on RNs not working in nursing and RNs employed and residing outside of Canada. For this reason, it is only appropriate to compare data prior to 1996 and data from 1996 to the present, in terms of RNs employed in nursing. A complete description of the methodologies use to eliminate interprovincial duplicates is available from the Senior Analyst, RNDB.

Data Definitions

Each of the data elements listed corresponds to a field on the registered nurse record. Only data elements utilised in tabulations in Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, 1999 are described below. For a complete list of data elements present in RNDB and the data dictionary please contact the Senior Analyst, RNDB.

Data Year

Refers to data year. RNs register in the present year (reference year) to work in the following year (data year).

Province of Registration

The province in which a RNs is licensed to practice nursing. Statistics Canada province/country codes are used.

Registration Number

A serial number that is unique to a particular RN but only within a particular province of registration.

Sex

Male, Female and Not Stated are submitted to CIHI. All unknown records are converted to Female status in editing process.

Year of Birth

Four-digit year of birth.

Actual Age

Generated from *Year of Birth*. If Year of Birth is valid then Actual Age = Data Year - Year of Birth.

Entry/Initial Nursing Education

Basic education program used to prepare a RN for entry into practice, leading to initial registration/licensure as a RN. Accepted responses are:

Diploma in nursing Bachelor's degree in nursing Master's degree in nursing Not Stated

All not stated records are converted to Diploma in nursing status in the editing process.

Province/Country of Graduation

Province/territory/country in which initial/entry nursing education was completed. Statistics Canada province/country codes are used.

Nursing education of at least 300 hours, other than entry/initial nursing education, which resulted in a non-degree certificate or diploma. Accepted responses are:

Counts

All counts, unless otherwise noted, are based on RNs employed in nursing. These figures represent the supply of RNs registering to practise within the given year. While the collection period represents the first six months of each jurisdiction's registration period, the majority of RNs register within this time period (greater than 95% in 1999). The counts exclude Registered Psychiatric Nurses (RPNs) who are required to register with Registered Psychiatric Nurses Associations in the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia.

Registered Nurses/Population Ratios

RNs/population ratios are computed for each province. The numerator is the number of RNs employed in nursing in a province and the denominator is the number of people in the province. Population data are updated annually based on general population estimates from Statistics Canada. All ratios are per 10,000 population.

Tabulations

In order to comply with CIHI's Privacy and Confidentiality guidelines, outlined in *Privacy* and Confidentiality of Health Information at CIHI: Principles and policies for the protection of health information (http://www.cihi.ca/weare/pcsdoc.htm) cells with counts less than five were suppressed. The following footnotes are included in tables where data suppression was necessary:

- * Amount too small to be expressed.
- ** Amount suppressed to ensure confidentiality.

Data Limitations

Users of this RNDB data should be aware that a comprehensive data quality review of RNDB data from 1980 to 1998 has not yet been completed. As such, historical comparisons should be completed with caution, especially with respect data involving employment status other than employed in nursing. The majority of tabulations in this publication reference RNs employed in nursing.

It is important to note that there are advantages and disadvantages to using RNDB data for registered nursing resource planning. The data provide information on the level of registered nursing supply in Canada (primarily RNs employed in nursing) but provide no indication of the level of activity or workload.

The limitations influencing the RNDB are common to most administrative databases. Administrative data are collected for administrative, not research purposes. The level of accuracy and completeness necessary to meet financial and administrative requirements of a registry can be considerably less stringent than that necessary for research. Nevertheless, improvements in data collection systems and the acknowledgement by jurisdictions of the need for quality data on which to guide health human resource planning has lead to improvements in data as it is captured at source. In addition, the following limitations influence the accuracy of the data in the RNDB: difficulty in mapping of variables on provincial forms to national standards; changes to registration forms which degrade the ability of jurisdictions to meet national reporting specifications; differences in registration periods across the provinces; the lack of a unique nurse identifier; and lack of geographical information (ie. postal code) on registered nurse place of work.

Products and Services

There are three types of products that are generated from the RNDB—ad hoc requests, publications and special projects. Ad hoc requests are generally short queries that do not require major programming resources. Most ad hoc requests can be handled through standard reports that are generated annually. Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, 1999 is the first in an annual series produced by CIHI. Special projects require project planning and the commitment of extra resources.

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Descriptive Analysis: Supply and Distribution of Registered Nurses in Canada, 1999

Number of Registered Nurses

The number of RNs in Canada has remained stable over the past four years, but has declined when compared to 1994 statistics. In 1999, there were 256,544 RNs in Canada, an increase of 0.6% from 1998 figures. Of those 256,544 RNs, 89.1% (228,450) were employed in nursing, 2.1% (5,390) were employed in other than nursing, and 3.4% (8,816) were unemployed. The remaining 5.4% did not state their employment status. Table 1 indicates the number of RNs employed in nursing and the number of RNs per 10,000 population by province/territory for 1994 to 1999.

1994 to 1996 data have undergone revisions. The revised data are considered to be more accurate and previously released figures should be ignored.

The 228,450 RNs employed in nursing represents a 0.4% increase from 1998, but a 2.5% decrease from 1994. This overall decrease is largely the result of provincial declines in Québec and Ontario, which typically account for more than half of the Canadian RN workforce. From 1994 to 1999, the number of RNs employed in nursing declined by 5% in Québec, and by 4% in Ontario.




Figure 1. Percentage Change in the Number of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Province/Territory, Canada, 1994 to 1999

While the number of RNs employed in nursing remained stable for most provinces during this period, the largest percentage changes occurred in the territories. However, the Yukon and Northwest Territories combined account for less than 0.5% of all RNs employed in nursing in Canada. Figure 1 shows the percentage change in the number of RNs from 1994 to 1999 for each province/territory.




Figure 2. Number of Registered Nurses in Canada, Registered Nurses and Labour Force Survey Data, Canada, 1994–1999

Data presented in Figure 2 regarding the number of RNs in Canada are comparable to data collected by Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey. The Labour Force Survey is (LFS) a monthly household survey representative of the Canadian non-institutional population 15 years of age and older. LFS data illustrated in Figure 2 are an annual average of 12 months of data.

Coupled with steady population growth and a moderate decline of 2.5% in the number of RNs, the number of RNs per 10,000 population has decreased. The 1994 Canadian figure of 80.3 RNs employed in nursing per 10,000 population decreased to 74.6 RNs per 10,000 population in 1999.

In 1999, eight provinces/territories were above the Canadian average rate of 74.6 RNs per 10,000 population, with only Alberta (74.0), Northwest Territories (70.6), British Columbia (69.0), and Ontario (67.6) below the national average rate. New Brunswick (101.9) was the only province/territory to exceed 100 RNs per 10,000 population.






Figure 3. Number of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing Per 10,000 Population by Province/Territory, Canada, 1999

Gender

The number of male RNs employed in nursing continues to increase in Canada, both as an actual number and as a percentage of the RN workforce. In 1999, males represented 4.6% (10,572) of the RN workforce employed in nursing, an increase from 3.9% (9,054) in 1994. Due to this increase, the female percentage of the RN workforce has declined from 96.1% (225,339) in Canada in 1994, to 95.4% (217,878) in 1999.

The Northwest Territories is the only province/territory to experience a decrease in the percentage of male RNs in the workforce from 1994 to 1999, while Québec continues to have the largest percentage of male RNs, accounting for almost 9% of its workforce in 1999. In contrast, only 1.3% of Prince Edward Island's employed RNs are male. Table 2 shows the number and percentage of RNs by gender and province/territory for 1994 and 1999.

Place of Work

Employment for RNs has been gradually moving out of general hospitals into community health settings. From 1994 to 1999, the percentage of RNs employed in hospitals decreased from 61.1% (143,191) to 59.4% (135,691).

In community settings, including community health agencies (from 6.0% of employed RNs in 1994 to 8.1% in 1999), nursing homes (from 10.8% to 11.7%), and home care (from 3.5% to 4.0%) the percentage increased.

Place of work varies greatly among the provinces and territories. The percentages of RNs employed in general hospitals in the territories are the lowest in the country, at only 42% in the Yukon and 46% in the Northwest Territories. However, the territories lead the country in the percentage of RNs employed in community health agencies (20% in the Northwest Territories and 13% in the Yukon), and in nursing station outposts/nurse clinics (18% in the Yukon and 16% in the Northwest Territories).

For each of the ten provinces, more than half of each respective workforce is employed in general hospitals, with large percentages of RNs employed in nursing homes in Prince Edward Island (16%) and Québec (15%), and in home care in Ontario (7%) and Saskatchewan (7%).




Figure 4. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Place of Work and Province/Territory, Canada, 1999

Figure 4 illustrates the percentage of the RN workforce employed in the four largest places of work by province, for 1999.

Primary Area of Responsibility

Although the majority of RNs provide direct patient care there has been a minor decrease in the proportion of RNs working in direct care. From 1994 to 1999, the percentage of RNs employed in Direct Care decreased from 88.2% (206,707) to 85.4% (194,995). However, much of this national decrease can be attributed to a significant number of "Not Stated" records from the province of Québec in 1999. The percentage of RNs working in Direct Care remained stable for the other provinces/territories from 1994 to 1999.

For Canada, most sub-categories within Direct Care experienced a decline from 1994 to 1999. The exceptions are Ambulatory Care (46% increase), Community Health (21% increase), Home Care (13% increase), and Geriatric/Long Term Care (1% increase).

The number of RNs employed in Administration increased by 2% in Canada, from 4.6% (10,772) in 1994 to 6.6% (15,175) in 1999, while the percentage of RNs employed in Research increased slightly from 0.7% (1,633) in 1994 to 0.9% (2,071) in 1999.

Québec (12.5%) and the Yukon (10.7%) have proportionately more RNs employed in Administration than other provinces/territories, whereas British Columbia (3.6%) and Alberta (4.2%) have the smallest percentage of RNs working in Administration. Alberta, Québec, and Nova Scotia were the only provinces/territories to have more than 1% of its RN workforce employed in Research in 1999.

The percentage of RNs employed in Education in Canada decreased from 4.5% (10,492) in 1994 to 3.0% (6,936) in 1999. British Columbia (3.8%) and Alberta (3.6%) lead all provinces/territories in the percentage of RNs employed in Education.

Table 3 presents the number and percent change of RNs by primary area of responsibility for 1994 and 1999.

Position

The percentage of RNs employed as Staff Nurses/Community Health Nurses appears to have declined since 1994. In 1999, 73.9% of RNs were employed as Staff Nurses/Community Health Nurses, down from 76.9% in 1994. However, much of this decrease is attributed to a significant rise in the number of 'Not Stated' and 'Other' records from Québec.

Nationally, the largest increases have been in the positions of Consultant (a 160% increase from 1994 to 1999), Clinical Nurse Specialist (53%), and Researcher (49%). Many management positions declined from 1994 to 1999, including Assistant/Associate Director, Chief Nursing Officer/Director, Head Nurse/Unit Manager, and Supervisor/Coordinator.




Figure 5. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed as Staff Nurses/Community Health Nurses by Province/Territory, Canada, 1994 and 1999

The percentage of RNs employed as Staff Nurses/Community Health Nurses varies among the provinces/territories. From 1994 to 1999, the percentage increased in seven provinces/territories, including substantial increases in British Columbia and Newfoundland. The largest decrease occurred in Manitoba, where the percentage of Staff Nurses decreased from 78% in 1994 to 68% in 1999. Figure 5 shows the percentage of RNs employed as Staff Nurses/Community Health Nurses by province/territory, for 1994 and 1999.

Full-Time/Part-Time Status

RNs are increasingly working part-time. In 1994, 54.9% of RNs employed in nursing worked full-time in Canada; by 1999 that percentage fell to 51.1%.




Figure 6. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Full-Time/Part-Time Status, Canada, 1994 and 1999

From 1994 to 1999, the percentage of RNs working part-time increased for all provinces/territories except British Columbia and the Northwest Territories. When comparing the provincial statistics presented in Table 4 below, it is important to note the number of 'Not Stated' records; many apparent changes, including those of British Columbia and the Northwest Territories, can be explained by a significant increase (or decrease) in the number of 'Not Stated' records.

Multiple Employment

An increasing number of RNs have more than one employer. In 1999, 16% of RNs employed in nursing indicated multiple employers, an increase from 10% in 1996. In addition, the number of RNs indicating a single employer has decreased, from 81% in 1996 to 79% in 1999. Data for multiple employment was not available for 1994.

In 1999, Saskatchewan and British Columbia each had 23% of its RNs working for multiple employers, the highest rate in Canada. In contrast, less than 9% of RNs in Newfoundland had more than one employer. Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick did not collect this data in 1999, and results from the Northwest Territories are skewed due to a substantial number of 'Not Stated' records.

International Migration

United States: Permanent Resident Status

Since 1993, the number of RNs gaining permanent residency in the United States has fluctuated annually. In 1997, the most recent year for which data are available, 545 RNs from Canada gained permanent residence status in the United States, approximately half the number that gained permanent residency in 1996. This decrease follows a general trend experienced by most other professional and technical occupations over this period.

Table 5 indicates the number of Canadian emigrants admitted as permanent residents to the United States from 1993 to 1997.

Canada: Landed Immigrants

According to data from Citizenship and Immigration Canada, the number of RNs entering Canada as landed immigrants decreased steadily from 1994 to 1998, remaining stable in 1999. Overall, the number of RNs entering Canada decreased 70.2% from 1994 to 1999.

Table 6 shows the number of RNs who became landed immigrants in Canada from 1994 to 1999.

Educational Characteristics of Registered Nurses

Initial/Entry Education

The percentage of RNs entering the workforce with a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing has increased in recent years. In 1999, 11.1% (25,337) of RNs employed in nursing had obtained a Bachelor's Degree in nursing before entering practice. This has increased from 10.5% in 1998, and 8.4% in 1994.

In 1999, the Yukon (19%) and New Brunswick (18%) had the largest percentage of RNs with a Bachelor's Degree for initial/entry education. Conversely, less than 7% of Québec's RN workforce began practice with a Bachelor's Degree.




Figure 7. Percentage of Workforce (Employed in Nursing) that Entered Practice with a Bachelor's Degree by Province/Territory, Canada, 1994 and 1999

Figure 7 shows the percentage of each province/territory's workforce that entered practice with a Bachelor's Degree in nursing.

In 1999, 88.9% (203,037) of all RNs employed in nursing had begun practice with a Diploma in Nursing, a decline from 91.6% of RNs in 1994.

Highest Education in Nursing

The percentage of RNs with a bachelor's degree as their highest education in nursing is increasing. In 1999, 22% of RNs held a bachelor's degree as their highest education in nursing, up from 17% in 1994. See Table 7.


As a percentage of the workforce, the Yukon led all provinces/territories in 1999 with 37% of its RNs attaining a bachelor's degree as their highest education in nursing. In each of Alberta, the Northwest Territories, and New Brunswick, 29% of RNs have a bachelor's degree. In contrast, only 17% of Newfoundland's and 19% of Ontario's workforce have obtained a bachelor's degree in nursing.




Figure 8. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing with a Bachelor's Degree as Highest Education in Nursing by Province/Territory, Canada, 1994 and 1999

Other Nursing Education (Non-Degree)

An increasing number of RNs are supplementing their education with non-degree courses. In 1999, 18.1% (41,283) of RNs indicated they had acquired further education (non-degree) in nursing. This represents a significant increase from 1996, when 14.5% (33,163) of RNs indicated further non-degree education. Non-degree nursing education data was not collected in 1994.

In 1999, 54% of RNs in the Northwest Territories indicated further non-degree nursing education, the highest percentage in Canada. In Ontario, 44% of RNs identified that they had obtained some type of non-degree education.

Education in Other Than Nursing

The number of RNs with a non-nursing degree is increasing. In 1999, 4.9% (11,248) of RNs employed in nursing had a bachelor's degree in a non-nursing discipline, an increase from the 3.4% (7,873) with a bachelor's degree in 1994. The percentage of RNs with a Master's Degree has increased as well, from 1.8% in 1994 to 2.1% in 1999. The percentage of RNs with a Doctorate has remained stable at 0.2%.

Provincially, British Columbia (8%) and Alberta (7%) have the largest percentage of RNs with a bachelor's degree in other than nursing.

Enrollment Data

Enrollment data from the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) indicates a shift toward baccalaureate (or bachelor's degree) education in nursing, as the number of students enrolled in nursing diploma programs is decreasing.

There were 19,489 students enrolled in nursing diploma programs in Canada in 1994, and 7,484 students in bachelor's degree (nursing) programs, a difference of 12,005. By 1998, the most recent year for which data are available, the gap between diploma and bachelor's degree programs had fallen to only 4,256 in Canada, with 13,178 enrolled in nursing diploma programs, and 8,922 enrolled in nursing baccalaureate programs. 


Figure 9. Number of Students Enrolled in RN Diploma and Baccalaureate (Nursing).

Programs in Canada, 1994 to 1998

Graduate Data




Figure 10. Number of Diploma and Baccalaureate Graduates in Nursing, Canada, 1994 to 1998

The number of nursing graduates reflects the trend witnessed in the enrollment data. According to the CNA, the number of diploma graduates of nursing programs fell from 6,064 in 1994 to 3,586 in 1999, a decrease of 40.9%. Over the same period, the number of graduates with a bachelor's degree in nursing increased 44.7%, from 1,323 in 1994 to 1,914 in 1999. See Figure 10.

Place of Graduation

Of the 228,450 RNs employed in nursing in Canada in 1999, 212,886 (93.2%) graduated from a Canadian nursing program, and 15,564 (6.8%) graduated from a foreign nursing program.

In 1999, 85.6% (181,516) of Canadian-trained RNs were registered to practice in the province in which they graduated. Québec had the highest proportion, with 97.9% of its Canadian-trained workforce graduating from a nursing program in Québec. In contrast, only 60.5% of Alberta's Canadian-trained workforce in 1999 graduated from nursing programs in Alberta, and similarly, only 63.5% of British Columbia's workforce graduated in British Columbia, indicating a higher rate of inter-provincial migration of RNs into those provinces.

Due to their large population, graduates from nursing programs in Ontario and Québec account for more than 60% of all Canadian nursing graduates. In addition to representing 90.7% of Ontario's Canadian-trained workforce in 1999, Ontario graduates accounted for 11.6% (2,767) of British Columbia's workforce, and 6.5% (1,388) of Alberta's workforce. In contrast, Québec graduates have migrated mainly to Ontario, representing 3.5% (2,470) of Ontario's workforce.

Table 8 presents the number and percent distribution of Canadian-trained RNs by Province of Registration and Province of Graduation, for 1999.

Of the 15,564 graduates of foreign nursing programs employed in nursing in Canada in 1999, 30.5% (4,744) were educated in the United Kingdom, 23.5% (3,657) were educated in the Philippines, and 9.4% (1,467) were educated in the United States. This represents 2.1%, 1.6%, and 0.6% of all RNs employed in nursing in Canada in 1999.

Table 9 presents the number and percent distribution of foreign-educated RNs employed in nursing in Canada in 1999.

Analytical Focus: Age Characteristics of Registered Nurses, 1999

Age Group Breakdown




Figure 11. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Age Group, Canada, 1994 and 1999

From 1994 to 1999, the number of RNs employed in nursing declined for each of the five youngest age groups in Canada, including a 25% decrease in the number of RNs aged 25-29, and a 20% decrease in the 30-34 age category. In the older age groups there was a 23% increase in the number of RNs aged 50-54, and a 26% increase in those aged 55-59. Figure 11 shows the percentage of RNs in each age category in 1994 and 1999.




Figure 12. Percentage Change in the Number of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Age Group, Canada, 1994 to 1999

The average age of the nursing workforce continues to increase in Canada. In 1999, Newfoundland had the youngest RNs in Canada, with an average age of 39.4 years. British Columbia, at an average age of 44.0 years, had the oldest nursing workforce in Canada, with Ontario second at an average age of 43.8 years. Table 10 illustrates the average age of each provincial/territorial workforce, for 1994 and 1999.

Gender - Age Breakdown

The average age of both female and male RNs is increasing in Canada. In 1994, the average age of a female RN employed in nursing was 41.6 years; by 1999, the female average age was 43.0. For males, who comprise less than 5% of the RN workforce, the average age increased from 38.4 years in 1994 to 39.9 in 1999.

Entry/Initial Education - Age Breakdown




Figure 13. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Entry/Initial Education and by Age Group, Canada, 1999

Younger RNs increasingly have a higher degree of education when entering practice in Canada. In 1999, less than 5% of RNs aged 50 or older entered nursing with a Bachelor's Degree. In contrast, more than 20% of RNs under age 35 entered practice with a Bachelor's Degree, as depicted in Figure 13.

In addition, the average age of RNs who began their career with a Diploma in Nursing is 43.5 years, more than 6 years older than those who began with a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing.

Area of Responsibility - Age Breakdown




Figure 14. Average Age of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Area of Responsibility, Canada, 1994 and 1999

On average, RNs who provide Direct Care to patients are younger than RNs in Administration, Education, or Research. In 1999, RNs working in Direct Care represented 85% of all employed RNs; of those, the average age was 42.4 years. That compares with average ages of 46.9 years in Administration, 46.5 years in Education, and 42.7 years in Research. The average age of RNs working in each of these areas of responsibility has increased since 1994, as shown in Figure 14.

Full-Time/Part-Time Status - Age Breakdown




Figure 15. Percentage of Registered Nurses Employed in Nursing by Full-Time/Part-Time Status and Age Group, Canada, 1999

RNs aged less than 35 years are more likely to work part-time than RNs over 50 in Canada. In 1999, 56% of RNs under age 35 were employed part-time, with 38% employed full-time (and 6% not stated). RNs over age 50 were almost the opposite, with 60% employed full-time, and 38% employed part-time (2% not stated). Figure 15 illustrates this breakdown for 1999.

The average age of an RN employed full-time in 1999 was 44.4 years, compared to an average age of 41.4 years for RNs employed part-time.



APPLICABLE BY-LAWS

Article II - Fees

Section 1

The annual fee for licence and renewal of licence shall be submitted with the licence application form and shall be received at the offices of the Association prior to 1 April of each year. The fee shall be fixed by the Council and ratified at an annual meeting of the Association. The reserve shall be valid for one (1) year, i.e. 1 April to 31 March.

Section 2

- a) All nurses who are EMPLOYED in the practice of nursing in the province must hold either a current interim certificate or current incende to practice
- b) All nurses EMPLOYED* in the practice of nursing who fail to renew an interim certificate or practising licence prior to 1 Apr. in accordance with Article II, Section 1, shall be subject to a late fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00)
 - * As defined by the NLHCA and includes casual status.
- c) All nurses who actively practise nursing without a valid interim certificate or practising licence shall be subject to a penalty fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25,00) per day worked, to a maximum of five hundred dollars (\$500,00). Default of payment of fees for three (3) months or more is subject to discipline in accordance with the Act. Section 21.

7 Section 4.

The fee for practising licence shall be pro-rated during the last three (3) months of the licensure year, i.e. January. February and March, for the nurse who

a) becomes eligible for initial registration

OR

b) becomes eligible for relicensure.

OR

c) commences nursing employment.

Article VI - REGISTRATION. Section 6. Maintenance of Licence to Practise, PRACTISING MEMBERSHIP.

A nurse seeking a practising licence shall be required to verify that she has:

- a) practised as a nurse for at least one hundred fifty (150) days (1125 hours) during the preceding sixty (60) month period OR sixty (60) days (450 hours) during the preceding twenty four (24) month period. OR
- b) completed a basic diploma or university diploma programme or baccalaureate nursing programme, or graduate programme in a health related discipline during the preceding sixty (60) month period, OR 1
- c) successfully completed an approved nursing refresher or re-entry programme during the preceding sixty (60) month period. OR
- d) enrolled in a university nursing programme and at the time of admission was eligible for a practising licence, for a maximum of sixty (60) months



REGISTERED NURSES PROFESSION ACT, Statutes of Yukon (1992)

15. No person shall engage in the practice of nursing in the Yukon unless

- they are a registered nurse and their name is entered in the roster of active practicing members and they hold a current annual certificate
 - they hold a temporary permit

QUALIFICATION FOR REGISTRATION

To questly for registration, nurses must meat one of the following conditions. Within the previous five (5) year period, you must have:

worked of least 1,125 hours; or graduated from a best nursing program; or completed on post-basic nursing degrees or completed an approved nurse refresher program.

FOR NEW APPLICANTS

- All new applicants for registration with YRNA must first hold valid registration in another Canadian jurisdiction. This Application for Registration must be completely and accurately filled out and returned to the YRNA office together with photocopies of your birth certificate and marriage certificate or other proof of legal name. A copy of your current practising card from another Canadian jurisdiction must also be enclosed.
- A Verification of Nurse Registration form must be completed in part by the applicant and forwarded to the appropriate provincial/territorial licensing association for completion. YRNA must receive the completed form by mail directly from the provincial/territorial licensing association.
- A Reference Request/Consent Form must be completed in part by the applicant and forwarded to your most recent nursing employer. The employer must complete the form and forward it by mail directly to YRNA.
- If you have completed a re-entry/refresher program within the previous five years, please have verification forwarded by the nursing program directly to YRNA.
- A processing fee of \$32.10 (GST included) must accompany this application as well as the appropriate registration fee as set out on the reverse. The registration fee will not be cashed until you meet all the requirements of registration. Payment may be in the form of cheque or money order made payable to YRNA.

REMEMBER, YOU MUST BE REGISTERED WITH YRNA BEFORE YOU START WORK AND REGISTRATION TAKES TIME SO PLEASE ALLOW A MINIMUM OF TWO WEEKS TO PROCESS YOUR PAPERWORK ONCE IT HAS BEEN RECEIVED

FOR RENEWAL OF REGISTRATION

- The YRNA membership year is April 1 to March 31. In order to process registration renewals in time to issue new membership cards by March 31st, this completed Application for Renewal of Licence should be received by YRNA no later than March 1et. The registration fee must accompany the completed form and may be in the form of cheque or money order payable to YRNA. Cheques may be post dated to March 31st. Please print your registration number on your cheque or money order. You should receive your Licence to Practice/Membership card by March 31st provided that your form and fee are received at the YRNA office by March 1, 1999. If either the form or your cheque are incorrect, the processing time will increase.
- If for any reason this Application for Renewal of License is not received before April 1st, a late registration foe of \$53.50 (GST included) should be included when forwarding this renewal form and the registration fee. Should this fee not be enclosed, YRNA will have to contact you and wait for the fee which will cause further delay in the registration process. Nurses must remember that they cannot, for any reason, practise nursing without valid, current registration.
- III) YRNA is attempting to streamline the registration renewal process by preprinting some of the required information. Please review all preprinted information for accuracy and make clear, visible corrections if the information is incorrect. Your cooperation is requested in completing this form as the information is required for legal purposes, for statistical purposes and for the analysis of the nurse work force in Yukon and Canada. PLEASE PROVIDE ALL INFORMATION REQUESTED.

RESIGNING YOUR MEMBERSHIP?

If you are no longer practising as a nurse in the Yukon and wish to resign your membership, please advise YRNA of your resignation. Return your registration renewal form with "RESIGNED" written clearly across the front or notify the office in writing of your intention. This will negate the need to send follow-up letters to you advising of your lapsed membership status

If you are not currently practising in the Yukon but think you may at some time during the 1999/2000 membership year, you may wish to renew your registration as a *Non-Practising* member now and upgrade your membership to *Active Practising* at a later date. Your *Non-Practising* tee will be applied to your *Active Practising* membership when you upgrade and you will not be charged the late registration fee of \$53.50 which is applied to renewals after March

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIP

Practising Member: An applicant who is practising or would like to engage in the practise of nursing in the Yukon must obtain Active Practising membership. An Active Practising member is entitled to full membership rights with YRNA and will receive the quarterly YRNA newsletter. Practising membership includes membership in the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA), the International Council of Nurses (ICN) and protessional liability protection services as available from the Canadian Nurses Protection Society.

Non-Practising Member. An applicant who is not engaged in the active practise of nursing in the Yukon may obtain Non-Practising membership. This category of membership may be selected by nurses seeking work in the Yukon and may be upgraded to Active Practising at any time by paying the difference between the two types of membership. Members in this category receive the quarterly YRNA newslotter.

Associate Member: Applicants who reside outside the Yukon or those who wish to maintain contact with YRNA may apply for Associate membership. An Associate member is entitled to membership with the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) and the International Council of Nurses (ICN). Associate members also receive the quarterly YRNA newsletter.

Temporary Practising or Temporary Student Member. See temporary permit information sheet and application form if requesting this type of membership.


