




OFFICIAL LANGUAGES AND BILINGUALISM ARE AT THE HEART OF CANADIAN IDENTITY


Population by First Official Language Spoken and Bilingualism, Canada

THEIR SECOND LANGUAGE 450,000 425,000 Young Canadians study French or 400,000 English as a second language



THE DEMOGRAPHIC PICTURE VARIES BY PROVINCE OR TERRITORY


Population by First Official Language Spoken and Bilingualism, Provinces and Territories
