Employment increases in January

Employment increased by 35,000 (+0.2%) in January, all in full-time work. The unemployment rate fell 0.1 percentage points to 5.5%. While employment in Newfoundland and Labrador was little changed, a large number of employees (50,000 or 25.5% of all employees in the province) lost work hours because of a severe winter storm.

Canada posts smallest trade deficit in five years

Canada's merchandise trade deficit with the world narrowed from \$1.2 billion in November to \$370 million in December, led by a rebound in energy

exports to the United States. Overall, the trade deficit totalled \$18.3 billion in 2019, the smallest deficit since 2014, when the last annual surplus occurred.

Some crops remain unharvested

As of December 31, 2019, total stocks of wheat (-0.5%), canola (-2.4%), corn for grain (-8.1%), lentils (-14.9%) and soybeans (-9.4%) were down year over year. Because of poor weather conditions during harvest, a substantial amount of crops likely remained unharvested at the time of the survey.

Parents play an important role as primary caregivers

Mental illness was the most common reason for receiving care (18%) in 2018, especially among young care receivers aged 15 to 34 (56%). Just over three-quarters (76%) of young care receivers stated that, were it not for their primary caregiver, typically their parent(s), they would have had difficulty finding help from someone else.
