Employment declines halt in May

In May, employment rose by 290,000 (+1.8%) while the number of people who worked less than half of their usual hours declined by 292,000 (-8.6%). Combined, these changes in the labour market represented a recovery of 10.6% of the COVID-related employment losses and absences of the previous two months.

Canada's trade deficit with the world more than doubles

Exports (-29.7%) fell to their lowest level in over a decade in April. Imports were down by one-quarter to their lowest level in nine years. The trade deficit



over doubled in April to \$3.3 billion, the highest level in just over one year.

Canadians remain vigilant about physical distancing and hand washing

Canadians participating in an online survey in early May were more likely to practice physical distancing while out in public (92%) than those who participated in a similar survey one month earlier (87%). The proportion of participants who reported washing their hands more regularly rose from 92% to 95%.

A larger share of young Canadians going to university

The participation rate of Canadians aged 18 to 24 in university or college was up by 29% from the 2000/2001 to the 2018/2019 academic years. This increase was attributable to a larger share of young Canadians going to university (+56%). The participation rate at the college level was relatively stable.
