#### UNUSUAL BIRD SIGHTINGS ON THE DUNK AND

#### WILMOT RIVER WATERSHEDS

The following is a list of unusual bird sightings observed on the Dunk and Wilmot River Watersheds and the area around Bedeque Bay during 1974 and 1975. These sightings were made while conducting a waterfowl study and, hence, do not cover all types of birds exhaustively or equally. For example, there was a greater likelihood of observing species associated with or living adjacent to waterfowl habitat than in other habitat types. However, species (e.g., warblers, owls) were observed as we walked the narrow wooded streams in spring and early summer or as we canoed the small ponds. Species related to agriculture (e.g., Hungarian Partridge) were observed while driving or walking from one river section to another.

In this article, I have recorded only sightings of birds which are considered in the Prince Edward Island Field Checklist of Birds (1974 edition) to be rare (1-5 birds per season), occasional (1-9 birds observed per decade), accidental (9 or fewer records per century), or hypothetical (unconfirmed sighting). (In some instances, the species is considered rare, occasional, accidental, or hypothetical and in other cases, the season in which they were observed makes the sighting unusual). A complete list of bird species observed on the Bedeque Bay area during the various seasons is available. Observations were made by myself and/or other field workers during the study: B. Butler, E. Hickey Jr., D. Smith, J. Steeves. Spring (March 16 - May 30); Summer (June 1 - July 30); Autumn (August 1 - December 16); Winter (December 15 - March 15).

NOTE: These two individuals resemble most closely Lawrence's Warbler as described in Roger Tory Peterson's Field Guide to the Birds. Lawrence's Warbler is a rare hybrid between the Blue-Winged and the Golden-Winged Warbler. These individuals (possibly a male and a female) had white wing bars characteristic of the Blue-Winged Warbler and the Black Breast (and throat) and the whitish belly characteristic of the Golden-Winged Warbler. There has been one (accidental) sighting of a Blue-Winged Warbler in Nova Scotia in May 1971. (Godfrey, Birds of Canada).
