This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Quebec and its regions.

OVERVIEW

After stagnating over the previous two months, employment in Quebec increased significantly in September according to the latest data from Statistics Canada's *Labour Force Survey*. There were 31,200 more people participating in the labour market than in the previous month (+0.7%), and more than 85%, or 26,600, of these additional jobs were full-time. Gains were recorded by both men (+16,500) and women (+14,700). Employment increased mainly among those aged 25 to 54 (+49,400), while it decreased among those aged 15 to 24 (-11,700) and 55 and over (-6,500). Employment also increased in Canada overall (+157,100 jobs or +0.8%), with gains in Ontario (+1.0%), Quebec and the four Western provinces (+0.7%).

In comparison with the other provinces, Quebec's unemployment rate, at 5.7%, is the second lowest in the country after Manitoba (at 5.6%). Unemployment rates are also down in Ontario at 7.3% and in British Columbia at 5.9%. However, there has been an increase in Alberta, where the unemployment rate is 8.1%.

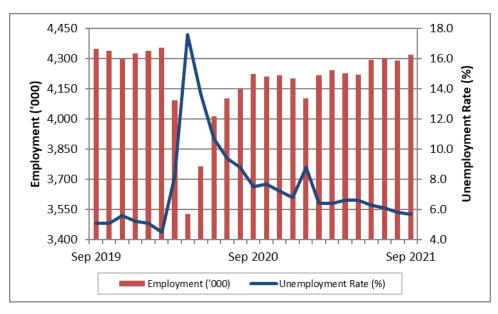

While Canada has returned to its pre-pandemic employment level (i.e., February 2020), Quebec still has a slight deficit of 34,000 jobs (-0.8%). It should be noted that full-time employment has now recovered the equivalent of all jobs lost since the beginning of the pandemic, with a rate of 100.3%. As a result, the shortfall is entirely in part-time employment, with its level corresponding to 94.3% of that in February 2020. For the first time, men have exceeded their pre-pandemic employment level, with a recovery rate of 100.2%, while women are 1.8% below their February 2020 level.

The number of unemployed persons, like the unemployment rate, has been trending downward for the past five months. In September, there was a decrease of 3,400 unemployed persons from the previous month (-1.3%), while the unemployment rate was 5.7% (-0.1 percentage points compared with August). This limited decline in unemployment while employment increased is due to growth in the labour force (+27,700 persons). As a result of these increases, both the labour force participation rate and the employment rate rose by 0.4 percentage points to 64.5% and 60.8%, respectively. However, when compared with the February 2020 rate, the employment rate shows a decline of 1.1 percentage points, not only because employment has not returned to its pre-pandemic level, but also because of population growth over the past 19 months.

EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY

When looking at the data by industry, it is interesting to note that the majority of jobs added in the last month (95.8%) are from the goods-producing sector, which accounts for only 20.8% of total employment in Quebec. This sector has shown an increase of 29,900 jobs (+3.4%) since August. The gains were mainly in manufacturing (+23,500 or +5.0%), but also in forestry, fishing and mining (+4,000 or +11.0%) and utilities (+2,700 or +10.2%).

In the services-producing sector, despite a rather stable outcome (+1,300 jobs or +0.0%), some industries showed significant growth, including professional, scientific and technical services (+13,000 or +3.6%); transportation and warehousing (+5,600 or +2.5%); and business, building and other support services (+5,300 or +3.3%). However, these increases were offset by declines in retail and wholesale trade (-17,500 or -2.6%), and accommodation and food services (-6,800 or -3.4%).

REGIONAL ANALYSIS

<u>Labour Force Survey data for the economic regions are three-month non-seasonally adjusted moving averages;</u> the September data therefore correspond to an average of July, August and September.

In September, 11 of the 16 economic regions had a higher level of employment than 12 months earlier. The economic regions where the level remained lower were Chaudière-Appalaches (-20,900 jobs or -8.8%), Saguenay–Lac-Saint-Jean (-10,800 jobs or -8.3%), Côte-Nord and Nord-du-Québec (-2,800 jobs or -5.4%), Mauricie (-2,500 jobs or -1.9%), and Lanaudière (-5,000 jobs or -1.8%). However, only six economic regions posted a higher level of employment than in September 2019, before the pandemic: the regions of Laval (+20,400 jobs or +9.7%), Montérégie (+12,300 jobs or +1.5%), Laurentides (+6,600 jobs or +2.1%), Centre-du-Québec (+5,200 jobs or +4.1%), Mauricie¹ (+1,600 jobs or +1.3%) and Bas-Saint-Laurent (+200 jobs or +0.5%).

Most economic regions reported decreases in their unemployment rates compared with those of September 2020, excluding the regions of Centre-du-Québec (+0.7 percentage points, to 5.1%), Laval (+0.3 percentage points, to 7.4%), and Côte-Nord and Nord-du-Québec (+0.1 percentage points, to 5.1%). In September 2021, four regions had unemployment rates of 4% or less: Capitale-Nationale (4.0%), Abitibi-Témiscamingue (3.9%), Chaudière Appalaches (3.6%) and Bas-Saint-Laurent (3.3%).
